COLONIST RATES FOR NORTHWEST

That Oregon will enjoy the colonist rate again this year, although not so low a rate as on former years, is shown by the following from a Portland paper, which says:

A most signal victory has been won by the railroads entering Portland in the fight they have been making for a reduced one-way colonist rate for the current year. While the victory is in the nature of a compromise, it will mean that there will be no staying of the tremendous rush of homeseekers to the northwest the coming spring, all interests which have been fighting for the low rate admitting that the \$5 increase above the previous rates will have no deterrent effect on the stream of Oregon-bound settlers.

So far as the local territory is concerned, the Hill roads are the only lines that opposed granting a colonist rate this year, and when Hill formed a combination with certain of the powerful eastern roads, against the lower rate, it looked as if Oregon had been delivered a body blow, as had both Washington and California.

Unfortunately for Washington there wasn't a line tapping that state that would stand up and fight for the \$33 middle west and \$22 Missouri river rates, and so strong and effective was the Hill and kindred opposition that the roads favoring the reduced rate saw there was only one hope of winning, and that was by consenting to a \$5 paster on the rate from the two sections, this compromise fixing the middle west rate at \$38 and the Missouri river rate at \$30.

The roads which deserve the credit for assisting the coast states in keeping up their rapid rate of settlement by eastern colonists are the following, each of which made individual demands for the former rates of \$33 and \$25 respectively: Union Pacific, O. R. & N., Southern Pacific, Oregon Short Line, Rock Island and the C. B. & Q. In other words, the Harriman system, with the aid of two other systems, whipped the recalcitrant Hill and associate systems into line by throwing a \$5 sop.

That there would be a colonist rate granted for the spring and fall seasons was announced in press dispatches from Chicago as follows:

The Rate Announced.
That the 2-cent fare regulation recently enacted by several western states will not operate to do away with colonist rates on the railroads leading to the Pacific coast was announced here yesterday. Independent notice to this effect had been given by the Southern Pacific, and other western roads are expected to follow the lead. Beginning March 1, and continuing until April, it is announced, the rates of \$38 from the middle west to the Pacific coast will be in effect for homeseekers.

From the Missouri river territory the rate to California will be \$30.

Pocket of Gas.
Payette, Jan. 15.—Gas was encountered yesterday afternoon in well No. 2 at a distance of 409 feet, which is the same depth at which it was encountered in well No. 1.
