OREGON C. E. WELL DRILL CONVENTION ABOUT READY

Eugene, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Plans for the 18th state convention of the Oregon Christian Endeavor union to be held in Eugene, February 20 to 23, inclusive, are well under way. The state president, Rev. C. T. Hurd of Corvallis, announces that a strong set of speakers is being secured for the convention. The list includes Rev. L. R. Dyott, pastor of the First Congregational church of Portland; Rev. W. H. Foulks, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland; President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon; President Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college; Revs. J. J. Evans, D. A. Thompson, A. A. Winter, and others. The program is not yet complete, but it includes conferences for the delegates, and open meetings for the people of Eugene; also three simultaneous meetings for Sunday afternoon, the last day of the convention—one each for men, women, and children. The railroads have granted the usual one and one-third fare to all delegates. Eugene Endeavorers have organized the necessary committees, and will provide entertainment for all accredited delegates. H. A. Scullen is chairman of the entertainment committee, and all names of delegates should be sent to him. There are between 200 and 300 of the Christian Endeavor societies in the state, and an attendance of fully 200 delegates is expected.

NORTH BANK LINK OPEN.
Line From Pasco to Lyle Ready for Freight and Passengers.
In an official announcement just issued, General Freight and Traffic Agent H. M. Adams of the North Bank road, says that the line is now open and ready for passenger and freight traffic from Pasco to Lyle, says the Dalles Chronicle. This is the opening of a second link in the line for Pasco to Portland, and adds about 33 miles to the section thrown open last month. This first section completed was 112 miles in length, from Pasco to Cliffs and has been in operation since December 15. Because of heavy and insistent demands of the territory tapped by the new road, west of Cliffs, all speed was made in extending the line to Lyle, at which point there is an interchange of both passenger and freight traffic with The Dalles, Portland & Astoria Navigation company. Through freights as already announced, have been established between Portland and Vancouver at the western terminal to Avery, Wash., and Finley, Wash.
