STARVING RUSSIANS GAIN AID THROUGH DOUMA

St. Petersburg, Jan. 23.—An additional appropriation for the thousands of famine-stricken peasants of Russia who are now on the verge of starvation is the most pressing matter before the members of the douma, who reassembled today after the long holiday vacation. This is in addition to the appropriation of \$7,500,000, which was voted by the douma before its recess, and which, with a few local bills, represented the entire legislative product of the first six weeks of the third douma. This vast sum, double the amount originally proposed in the budget, was exhausted in only partially relieving the suffering in 12 provinces. A large part of the money was distributed through the zemstvos and other local organizations, as the centralization of relief

work had previously resulted in grave abuses. Reports from various provinces state that conditions are worse than ever and that an additional appropriation is urgently needed. The 169 members of the first douma, who were convicted of treasonable conduct in signing the Viborg manifesto have appealed to the senate and will be given a final hearing in the near future. Three months' imprisonment for each of the convicted men was the sentence imposed, but this apparently light punishment is made severe by the fact that they all are prevented from taking any part in political affairs in the future. It is unlikely that the senate will interfere with the execution of the sentence.
