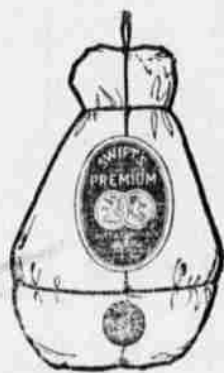

LA GRANDE LOSES OFFICE

La Grande is no longer the headquarters of the block signal service department on the O. R. & N.

Superintendent W. M. Quinn, formerly located here while superintending construction and repair work over his district, from Portland to Huntington, has been called to Portland and to locate there hereafter. His territory will remain the same, but his superiors wish his location changed, as the extreme east end of the line has been practically completed.

The block signal service is now in full force over all portions of the O. R. & N. that cross mountains. In fact, a greater part of the road between Huntington and Portland is equipped with this catastrophe-saving device. Along the Columbia river, where the track is in the open, there are places where the service is not yet installed.

Mr. Quinn will move his family to Portland some time this month or early in February. The office paraphernalia has already been shipped to the metropolis.

CARRY TWINS IN VALISE
