On January 3, the president threw out of the Blue Mountain National forest most of that land included in the ranger protest which was circulated about a year ago. A description of this land was obtained from Supervisor Childsey and the following is an official list:

Samuel Gompers is 58.

Washington, Jan. 27.—Fifty-eight years ago today in London, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, first saw the light of day. As the head of the greatest organization of workmen in the world, he is now an international figure, and the recipient of congratulations, not only from other labor leaders, but from men high in the world of commerce, literature and government. Recent attacks made upon his character and methods have served only to augment the respect in which he is held by millions of his fellow citizens.

Gompers was born in London January 27, 1850, the son of a cigar-maker. He attended school for four years, and this was the extent of his formal education, with the exception of a few terms at a night school while working in his father's cigar shop.

At the age of 13 Gompers came to America, settled in New York city, and in time became a naturalized citizen of the United States. When only a lad of 14 Gompers began his career as a labor leader by aiding in the organization of the Cigarmakers' International union, of which he later became secretary and president. In 1881 he was the pioneer in the organization of the American Federation of Labor, and has been its executive head since that time, with the exception of two years.

The great labor leader is a man of scholarly, refined tastes, and his appearance is that of a college president rather than a labor leader. He is a short, bulky, stout man with a big head set on square shoulders. His expressive face bespeaks intellect, determination and a wide charity. He is a constant smoker, and pairs his cigars in the energetic way that marks all his actions. He is a member of no church or religious organization, although in New York he was a regular attendant at the meetings of Dr. Felix Adler's Ethical Culture society.

The bulky form of Gompers is frequently to be seen at the capitol during the sessions of congress. He watches closely all labor legislation and frequently appears before congressional committees to argue the cause of organized labor. In his relation to bills affecting the interests of workers, laboring men throughout the land have benefited by his

activities and probably will continue to do so for many years to come, since President Gompers, at the threshold of his 59th year, retains to a wonderful extent all the mental and physical vigor of a man 29 years younger.
