ENGLISH PARLIAMENT OPENED WITH POMP

London, Jan. 19.—What promises to be a highly important and critical session of the British parliament, the third under the premiership of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, convened today with the customary observances. The Irish question, the education bill, licensing, old age pensions and the budget demands of the army and navy are the principal subjects likely to come up for consideration and debate during the session. The session was opened by King Edward.

In the matter of expenditures for the army and navy, the economists and the expansionists have apparently agreed upon a compromise, which will result in a retrenchment for the benefit of this year's budget, but will involve a greatly increased appropriation next year. The expansionists are advocating an increase of \$3,000,000 in the naval estimates, to meet the German proposals, an additional million for the army and a similar increase for education, involving an increase over last year of 10,000,000 pounds or nearly \$50,000,000. In case the expansion plans are carried out, a further increase of 25,000,000 pounds, or \$125,000,000, will be required next year. If a policy of retrenchment is decided on this year, it must be with a promise of greatly increased naval expenditures for 1909. The partisan press is already raising the cry of the German bugaboo and popular clamor is taking it up and raising a formidable agitation against the government.

There is a wide difference of opinion among the naval experts in regard to the Edgar and Beadicea types of cruiser and on many other plans for strengthening the fleet, and the economists urge this as the principal reason for not rushing into tremendous naval expenditures until the mooted questions have been satisfactorily

settled. In the matter of legislation, Irish affairs are certain to come up for prolonged consideration. The opposition is threatening to provoke a detailed discussion of the government's Irish policy. If such a course is decided on, it will likely result in many lively debates, and will place Irish Secretary Birrell on the defensive, with the result that he will probably be forced to make a definite statement of future policy. The younger Nationalists are willing and eager for the fray, and if opportunity allows, will turn loose upon parliament a very flood of oratory.

The liquor question has become a live one in England and it is proposed to introduce an exceedingly drastic license bill. While the measure does not meet all the demands of the temperance party, it is sufficiently drastic as to have aroused the organized opposition of all the liquor dealers, brewers and distillers of the kingdom. The liquor interests are very powerful in England and they may depend upon the house of lords rejecting the bill or emasculating it to such an extent as to render it void. The bill, as originally formulated, will provide for a modified form of local option after a specified period.

The opening of the session today was accompanied by all the traditional pomp and ceremony. King Edward was accompanied by Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of the royal family, and were greeted in the historic chamber by the usual gathering of dignitaries. The king and queen will leave about the first of next month for their annual spring cruise, the royal yacht having been ordered in readiness at that time. The king will stop at Biarritz, but the queen will proceed to Athens to visit her brother, the Greek king.

BREAKS BONE IN HIS ANKLE

Jack Brittain, an employe of the Grande Ronde Electric company, sustained severe injuries late yesterday afternoon while lowering a heavy pulley to the basement of the company's building in this city.

The pulley weighs nearly 600 pounds and Mr. Brittain was attempting to lower it by rolling it down the stairway. An obstruction below caused him to leave the object of his labor at the head of the stairs, while he went down to remove a cross beam which was in the way. He had kicked up the timber and was in the act of carrying it away when the pulley was jarred loose and started down the stairway with terrible force. Fortunately for the man he was not in the direct path of the falling pulley, but did receive a jolt from behind which threw him to the floor with considerable force. In the fall one foot rested in front of the now rapidly rolling machinery and a broken bone in the ankle is the result.

He was removed to his home on Sixth street, where he today gives signs of rapid recovery.

The injury is extremely painful, but alleviates his suffering with the optimistic view that his escape with a broken bone is remarkably fortunate.

LEAVE MONEY IN THE BANK

North Powder, Jan. 19.—(Observer Special.)—Depositors in the State Bank of North Powder, met here yesterday afternoon to take action relative to the institution's future. The present situation was explained by J. P. Myers, assignee, and after listening to his explanation, the depositors agree to leave their shares in the bank, but to take their value out in National bank stock.

Mr. Myers further agreed that at the end of the year he would buy up their stock and pay them 6 per cent interest. The bank's capital is \$25,000, and shares sold for \$100. In 30 days' time the bank will be reorganized as a national institution.
