Land office officials in La Grande are in receipt of the following from E. A. Ballinger, commissioner of the general land office:

Gentlemen: There has been injudiciously circulated by way of newspaper advertisements, and otherwise, over the name of F. P. Wolfe, statements to the effect that Congressman Tawney, after a conference with the commissioner of the general land office, advised his son that persons filing on the Oregon and California railroad lands would, without doubt, be able to secure the lands. These advertisements are untrue and misleading. The tendency of such advertisements is to impose upon innocent and unsuspecting persons. bonds and certificates and methods he had employed during the recent money panic. The explanation was lengthy, but was listened to with great attention.

"It was the deliberate intention of the administration to make the offer of bonds more attractive than certificates; the purpose being to avoid the withdrawal of funds from the banks and to increase the bank circulation," reads the explanation.

He showed that bonds were distributed through 40 states and certificates through 18. It was made public for the first time that the bonds were oversubscribed 44 times.

Congressman Ellis yesterday called upon the agricultural department to discuss the advisability of beginning the irrigation experiments early this spring and secured from that department a promise that such would be done.

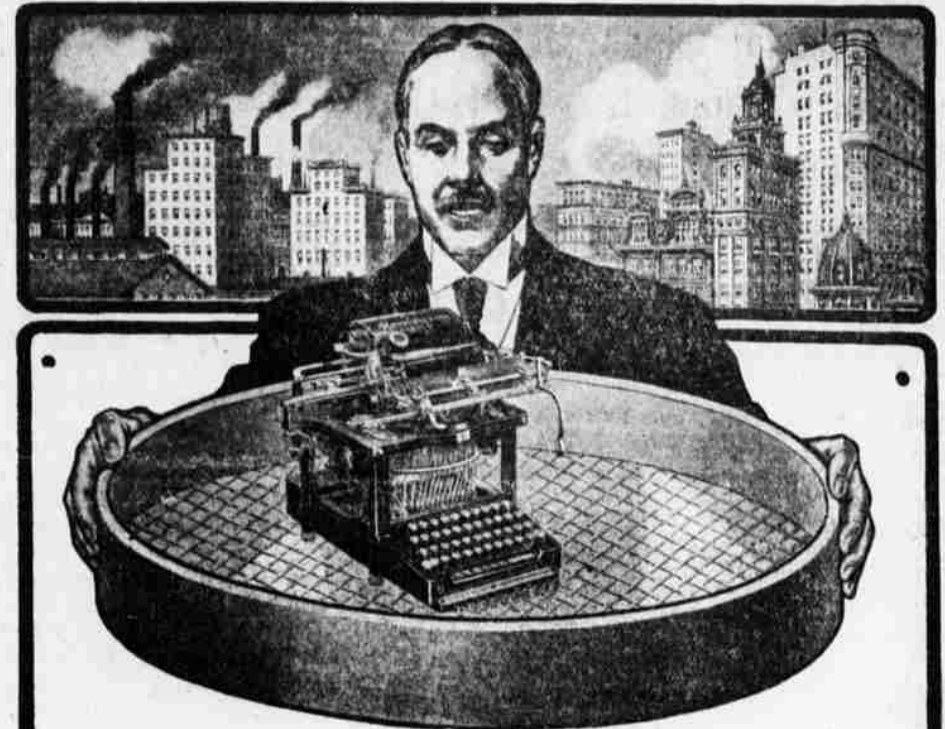
The 40-acre tract was set aside for an experimental farm some time ago, but it has not been known whether the agricultural department would

carry on the experiments or whether the state would be asked to bear the expense and furnish the experts for this purpose. The visit of Mr. Ellis to the secretary of agriculture yesterday has settled the question and now Umatilla is assured of government experiments in irrigation farming this season.

The tract set aside for this purpose is near the reservoir of the Umatilla project, and is favorably situated for extensive experiments. It can be

easily irrigated and the soil is typical of that section of the county and it is believed that the experiments conducted there will serve as a safe criterion for farmers on the government project.

The beginning of the government experiments is awaited with much interest by the settlers of that section of the county, as it is expected that much valuable information concerning irrigation and irrigated crops will be brought out during the season.
