Sentenced and Paroled.

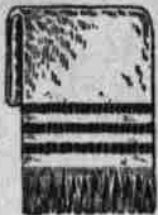

New Motor Power Discovered.

It is reported by Hudson Maxim, the inventor of smokeless powder, that he has devised a torpedo boat that will travel 60 miles an hour. His secret is in a new motor power; motoite, he calls it. This new power will be used to propel the torpedo as well as the torpedo boat. The invention will be put at the disposal of the United States government, and it is said to be the most destructive means of naval warfare possessed by any nation. The rate of speed of the present Whitehead torpedo is 35 miles an hour. Not only will the speed of the motoite torpedo be more than a mile a minute, but the range will be twice the distance covered by the present torpedoes driven by compressed air.

The secret of motoite is a delicate blend of nitro-plycerine, gun cotton, one other substance, not disclosed, and the application of a new system of jet propulsion, the same principle on which automobiles are run. Mr. Maxim started out seeking to invent a torpedo that would surpass the speed of the slow Whitehead torpedo. He not only did that, but discovered a motive power so tremendous that it is expected to revolutionize submarine warfare and may even, later, send trans-Atlantic liners across the sea faster than the fastest express trains move on land.—Ex.
