BIG CONGRESS PREPARATIONS

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. — Preparations for the 16th National Irrigation congress are progressing very satisfactorily. The office of the congress on the first floor of the Commercial club building in Albuquerque is a very busy place. Col. Hopewell, chairman, and Col. Twitchell, secretary of the board of control, aided by a corps of efficient clerks, are engaged day and night in sending out all sorts of advertising literature to the various executive committees and others prominently identified with irrigation matters in the 17 states and territories under the reclamation act. A great deal of correspondence is also being carried on with eastern manufacturers, farm journals and commercial organizations. A widespread interest in the great session of the congress is made evident by the great amount of correspondence. Letters are coming from men high in the affairs of the nation, of states and from our sister territory of Arizona. The board of control is in correspondence with a number of foreign governments, notably Great Britain and Mexico. All of the correspondents living west of the Missouri River are interested in the Interstate Industrial exposition that will be held with the congress and to be a part of and followed by the 28th Annual Territorial fair. Letters are also being received from great manufacturing concerns desiring to give trophies for various kinds of exhibits at the exposition.

WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION.

Purchasers of Canned Fruit Demand the Best and Will Have it.

There are many new canneries to be started in Oregon. In a few places the talk is to have a cannery to use the surplus fruit. This is a poor basis for a cannery. In order to have

a successful cannery, raise fruit for the cannery and ship the surplus. Naturally the fruit which will sell best on the market will be the "surplus" selected for shipment, but canneries which have to depend upon the use of fruit which cannot be otherwise sold will not be a success. If Oregon is to build up a great canning industry it will be because it can raise first-class fruit.—Oregon Agriculturist.

GUARDIANSHIP.
