**SLIGHT FLOW IN COVE
POWER DITCH THIS WEEK**

Provided that the present thaw continues La Grande will be furnished with light in two days, is the ultimatum of Manager Fred Housh, who visited Cove last evening. He found a slight flow of water in the ditch, but it is not sufficient to generate any quantity of electricity. The ditch which conveys the water to the power plant is frozen at the summit and what water is now flowing is caused by the present thaw and is not actual

opening of the ditch. Should the present flow be augmented by thawed snows and ice in the same quantity that it has in the past two days, the wheels will be turning by Sunday, it is believed. It is thought, however, that in the event that electricity can be made at that time, it will only be in such quantities as to warrant turning on the street light circuit, and not the house lights of La Grande.

quarters in the past, she should be entitled to it under the present bill. However, Pendleton did not look at the situation in that light so the meeting did not bring any definite results. It is understood that Baker will redouble her effort to secure the headquarters.—East Oregonian.
