NEW RULES FOR ENTRY

Eligibility rules to be adopted by the Eastern Oregon Interscholastic association this year, are to be drawn more closely toward that point for which all similar rules are drafted—better scholarship on the athlete's part.

A revised and more strenuous set have been drafted by the Baker City faculty, and have been sent to the other principals of eastern Oregon for perusal, correction or endorsement as the case may be. They have reached La Grande, but met with a setback here for the La Grande faculty, like others of the Grande Ronde valley, believe them to be too lenient in their requirements.

As drawn up and passed upon by the Baker high school faculty, the eligibility of a student to enter in the annual track and field meet, which is to be held at Union this year, among other things, provides that the student shall be a bona fide student in the school which he represents for four months previous to the day of the meet. Bona fide is then construed to mean, carrying passing grades in two actual studies in that school.

Locally, and in Island City, Cove and Union, this standing is not sufficient, is the belief.

The stand taken by Union county faculties is commendable. Any athlete should be the leader of his class, and in a large majority of cases, is. Consequently, to remove the common obstacle to athletics in high schools, the requirements of all athletes should be extremely high, thus fostering two valuable phases of the young man's development—thorough knowledge of a full course of study, and the development of his muscular being.

Before being returned to Baker City, the requirements will have appended to them several proposed amendments, which should be adopted and enforced, if the annual interscholastic track and field meet of high school students shall remain an auxiliary to the high school and not a department run independently of common requirements.

Handy in the Kitchen.

Take a board 10 inches long, an inch thick and two inches wide and cover it with several thicknesses of emery paper No. 0. Bore a hole in one end of the stick and run a strong cord through it and fasten to a hook above the sink. This will be useful for sharpening steel knives, scissors or needle points, or removing rust from any iron or steel pieces. When the rough top has worn off, take the sharp knife, remove the upper layer and you have a new piece on top.
