DELAY RUMOR IS ERRONEOUS

Seattle.—(Special correspondence.)—Owing to a slight rumor that the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition is going to be postponed caused by the recent financial flurry, the executive committee of the 1909 fair has passed the following resolution: "It is the unanimous opinion of the members of the executive committee that the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition be held at the place and time hitherto planned—Seattle, U. S., from June 1 to October 15, 1909."

The contract for another large exhibit palace, the Agricultural building, has been let for \$81,830. Six of the main buildings will soon be well under way. The Manufacturers building is progressing rapidly.

The executive committee announces that there is plenty of money on hand with which to carry on the work and that money for stock is coming in all the time.

Word received from Washington, D. C., from Vice-President John H. McGraw, Director of Exploitation H. E. Ridd, indicates that congress is looking with favor on the exposition. The appropriation bill will soon come up for consideration. The government has asked for more ground space than was originally allotted to it.

The management of the exposition has secured the services of Col. Henry E. Dorsch, of Portland, Ore., as director of the division of exhibits. The exhibits department is being organized and prospective exhibitors can now receive information in regard to space by applying to Col. Dorsch. Already many large firms throughout the country have applied for space.

Col. Dorsch represented the state of Oregon as commissioner at New Orleans, Chicago, Omaha, Buffalo, and Charleston in this country and at the Fifth International exhibition held at Osaka, Japan, in 1903, he was commissioner from the state of Oregon and Lewis and Clark exposition.

The directors of the Japanese exposition recognized Col. Dorsch's ability as an "expositionist," and placed him in charge of all foreign exhibits. His services were recognized by the emperor of Japan, who decorated him with the medal of a chevalier of the sacred treasure. Col. Dorsch was also given a diploma of merit for his services at the Osaka exposition. It bears the signature of the mikado and the royal seal.

Colonel Dorsch was also commissioner general to the Louisiana Purchase exposition for the Lewis and Clark fair.

Delegates to Chicago Convention.

The republican national convention which will nominate candidates for president and vice-president, at Chicago, June 15, will consist of 880 delegates. The last convention was composed of 994 delegates, but the national committee has reduced the representation of the territories and the District of Columbia from six to two delegates. Oklahoma comes in with 14. It will require 491 votes to nominate. The following list shows the number of delegates to be sent from each state.
