SUIT FOR DAMAGES.
Prunes Were Delayed in Being Shipped From Here to St. Paul.

Freewater, Ore., Feb. 7.—The Walla Walla Produce company, which has a branch fruit house in Freewater, has instituted suit against the Northern Pacific Railway company for damages to a carload of prunes which were being shipped from here to St. Paul. The car was delayed in transit, causing a loss of \$500 to the produce company.

The company is represented by Attorneys George F. Stiles of St. Paul, and C. T. Godwin of this place. The railroad company is represented by Attorney Spencer of Portland. The evidence of Manager N. W. Mumford and Roy Edwards, employees of the produce company, was taken before the justice yesterday. The case will be continued in a few days.

Baker County Pioneer Dead.

After a brief illness Charles Rimbold died at the Crabill hotel yesterday morning at 7:30.

Mr. Rimbold was born at Dun Surr, Norm., France. At the time of his death he was nearly 80 years of age.

In the early sixties Mr. Rimbold came to Baker county and located at Auburn. He engaged in placer mining. Later he went to Sumpter, when the placer diggings were first discovered there, and for nearly a quarter of a century worked in the mines with fair success. He owned the townsite of Sumpter with his partner Joseph Young, deceased, sold it and lived to see the town grow to a prosperous mining camp. A few years ago he came to Baker City and made this his home up to the time of his death.

Mr. Rimbold was most respected of men, having all the chief attractions that go to make the salt of the earth—charity, loyalty and fidelity. His relatives reside in their native town in France. He was a member of Baker City lodge No. 25, I. O. O. F.

Mr. Rimbold's funeral is to take place at Sumpter.—Baker Democrat.

Luper Dies on Train.

Sylvanus Luper, a young man whose home was Amity, Yamhill county, died on train No. 5 last night, while the passenger was between La Grande and Kamela, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. At the time of his death he was being brought to Pendleton for treatment at St. Anthony's hospital. J. C. Luper, a brother, and Miss Ora Luper, a sister, were waiting at the depot for him and heard of his death by wire a few minutes before the train arrived.

Young Luper had been living at Burns and was suffering from pneumonia and other complications. The immediate cause of his death was bronchitis.

When the train arrived the body was taken off here and is now at the Baker & Folsom undertaking parlor. It will be shipped to Amity tomorrow and the funeral held there.
