OPEN YAKIMA LAND SOON

That it is the intention of the department of the interior to endeavor to open 1,145,000 acres of land in the Yakima reservation to settlement this year is the statement contained in the annual report of the department just issued from the government press at Washington, says the Yakima Republic.

Whether or not the preliminary work which has been done in the way of classifying and valuing the lands will be completed in time for the opening this year remains to be seen, but it is the general opinion that if the work is not done this year the reservation will be opened to settlement early next year in time to allow of the new settlers getting in their crops for the harvest of 1909.

Valuable Land Available.

Those who are acquainted with the character of the lands which are to be made available for the white farmers are aware that some of the most valuable land in the country is contained within the reservation, and that there will be a great rush for holdings goes without saying. The lands will be valued and the successful applicants will have to pay in installments this purchase price—which goes to the Indian owners—in addition to the usual homestead fees.

One of the most immediate results of the opening of the reservation will be the rapid development of the reservation towns and with the prospect of the early influx of hundreds of white farmers to the reservation speculators are looking to Toppenish and Wapato real estate as a good proposition. But North Yakima, as the metropolis of the valley, will benefit to a great extent also.

The wide interest taken in the prospective opening of the reservation is indicated by the hundreds of letters of inquiry from all parts of the country which have reached the local United States land offices during the past month or two. People in the middle western states, particularly, are anxious to have a look in when the time for applying for holdings arrives.
