Eligibility Rules Ratified.

Four rules governing the condition to be imposed upon all who enter intercollegiate athletics were introduced and ratified in the athletic conference in session in the Y. M. C. A. building of this city today, says the Walla Walla Bulletin of February 7th. The rules are:

Compelling a student to maintain a residence at any college for one year providing he has been a student at any other college, before he can enter athletics for more than four years; providing that no preparatory school student shall take part in contests unless he has been in school at least a year; and, compelling an athlete to carry three-fourths of the maximum hours of study imposed by his class.

President S. B. L. Penrose of Whitman college, was chairman, and Carl McLain of the University of Oregon was chosen secretary.
