The energetic efforts of Baker to land the seat for the federal court is to be strengthened by sending Mayor C. A. Johns to Washington to appear before the house of representatives, and urge the need of establishing the district, says the Herald.

Charlie Murphy is already at the capital, having started the first of the week. The matter of choosing two representatives to go to Washington was decided by the business organizations, but only Mr. Murphy was chosen for several days, the other member being selected last evening.

A most active campaign is planned to begin at once. The representatives will bring to the personal attention of each member of the house committee facts and data to justify their position in asking that the federal district be created. Mayor Johns will leave for the capital the first of next week.
