Imbler, Ore., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—As the election time draws nearer the question is often asked: Will Imbler get a saloon this election? They say it will help the town, but do they know that Imbler now is three times the size it was when it had a saloon? Again, you can be convinced by seeing the towns of Muskogee, Tulsa and South McAlester, formerly in the Indian territory, but now a part of Oklahoma, that have a population of from 15,000 to 30,000, and a saloon has never existed in them. Wallowa county is more prosperous today than it ever was before. It is just as impossible to run saloons without boys as it is a mill without wheat. Who will furnish the boys?

TOWN WITHOUT A NAME.

Has Hotels, Shops and Other Buildings, But No Townsite.

A good, healthy and thriving town, though so far nameless, is springing up on the right of way of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, about 12 miles from Taft, or midway between the main St. Joe, where Pinchot is located, and Taft, says the Lewiston Teller.

Already there are hotels, feed stables, a slaughter house and several other buildings in town and the forestry officials have just received an application from C. B. Peck and Geo. B. Singleton for permission to erect a building and conduct a general merchandise business at the place.

The ground is said to be held by private individuals under quartz and placer mining locations and tracts are rented to the newcomers, though it is necessary to get a permit from the government before engaging in business on account of the site's being on reserve.

As yet there have been no townsites formally laid out along the Milwaukee through the reserves, although the local forestry officials have been expecting petitions for this purpose. The site at Pinchot is owned by a private individual, and it is probable a townsite will soon be laid out there, though it is reported there will be little room for the town after the sidetracks and railroad shops are erected.

After Gambling Hard.

We desire to call attention to section 1944 of the codes and statutes of Oregon, which reads as follows, relates the district attorney of Baker City in the Herald: "Each and every person who shall deal, play, or carry on, open or cause to be opened, or who shall conduct either as owner, proprietor, or employee, whether for hire or not, any game of faro, monte, roulette, rouge et noir, lanquet, rondo, vingtun (or twenty-one), poker, draw poker, brag, bluff, thaw, or any banking or other game played with cards, dice, or any device, whether the same be played for money, checks, credits or any other representative of value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500, and shall be imprisoned in the county jail until such fine and costs shall be paid; provided, that such person so convicted shall be imprisoned one day for each two dollars of such fine and costs. And, provided further, that such imprisonment shall not exceed one year."

A number of citizens have been assisting this office in procuring evidence for the enforcement of the above section. Therefore, unless gambling in Baker county is immediately stopped and wholly discontinued, prosecutions will follow for the full enforcement of the law.
