TEST FIRE PROTECTION

To ascertain the pressure of water lines and efficiency of the fire protection in the local railroad yards, a corps of civil engineers sent here from Portland, spent the day drawing plans and taking data relative to existing conditions.

If the present arrangement and equipment for fire protection is inadequate, and the engineers find it so, additional water lines will be laid. Under the old arrangement of O. R. & N. shops and buildings in general, the water supply for fire protection was fully sufficient, but since the new buildings have been erected and old ones torn down, there is evidently some question in the minds of the officials as to the thoroughness of the system as it now is. The engineers have conferred with City Water Superintendent Gilman and others, and by this evening will have completed their work on reports that are to be made, will depend in a large measure, whether or not the yards are to be repiped with mains and sub-lines.

SNUG SUM REALIZED

The building fund of the Elks' lodge has been swelled approximately \$300 during the past two evenings, by reason of the minstrels, which the lodge gave in this city.

The fund has long since assumed considerable proportions and every little bit added to what it had makes just a little bit more.

There is to be no let-up in the building movement. Now that the minstrels are off their hands, the members will devote themselves to forming a building association, which in turn is to erect the building. This association is to be similar to the Masonic building association, and will carry to the finish, building plans that are now in the embryo.

Wisconsin Democratic Convention.
Milwaukee, Wis., Feb. 13.—Delegates to the number of 677 assembled this afternoon to name candidates for Wisconsin's delegates to the democratic national convention in Denver. Milwaukee has 93 delegates in the convention. The contest for delegates-at-large has been a stiff one and several prominent politicians are in the field for the honor of leading Wisconsin's delegation at Denver. It is likely that Bryan will be the choice of the democratic voters of this state, little opposition to his nomination having developed here. It is probable that the convention will be unable to complete its business today and will be continued tomorrow. The convention will adopt a platform and select candidate for delegates-at-large to go before the primaries in the spring. The delegates from the various congressional districts selected at district caucuses will be submitted to the state convention for approval.
