PENDLETON HUSTLING IN FIGHT FOR FEDERAL BUILDING

Pendleton's campaign for the location of the headquarters of the new federal district for eastern Oregon was formally launched at a rousing meeting of Pendleton Commercial association last night, when urgent demands were made upon the Oregon congressional delegation that Pendleton be named as headquarters for the proposed district.

After discussing the matter thoroughly from every standpoint in which discussion it was emphatically demonstrated that the unanimous sentiment of business men and attorneys that Pendleton is the logical location for the headquarters, a committee consisting of T. C. Taylor, Charles H. Carter, W. L. Thompson, G. W. Phelps and Bert Huffman was appointed to draft resolutions to forward by wire to the Oregon delegation, demanding that Pendleton's claims be urged in the passage of the bill.

A message was sent by President Rader of the Commercial association last night, demanding that Pendleton be named as headquarters and this morning an additional message was sent by the committee appointed to draft the resolutions.

Following is the message sent to the Oregon delegation by the Commercial association last night:

"Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 12.
 "To Congressman W. R. Ellis, and Senators C. W. Fulton and Jonathan Bourne, Washington, D. C.

"Pendleton Commercial association demands that Pendleton be named as headquarters of the eastern Oregon federal district upon indisputable merits of geographical location, best interests of entire district and volume of business.

"M. A. RADER,

The message sent to the Oregon delegation this morning was as follows:

"Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 13.
 "To Congressman W. R. Ellis, Senators C. W. Fulton and Jonathan Bourne, Washington, D. C.

"At a mass meeting of citizens and business men the demand of Pendleton Commercial association that the headquarters of the eastern Oregon federal district be located in this city is emphatically endorsed. The best interests of the entire district will be served by making Pendleton the headquarters. T. C. Taylor, W. L. Thompson, G. W. Phelps, Charles H. Carter, Bert Huffman, committee."

Statistics gathered from the federal court records in Portland showing the volume of business originating in

the different counties of the proposed district have been forwarded to Congressman Ellis and it is believed that the showing made will assure the location of the headquarters here.

Attorneys present declared that cases from this county have been pending for five years in the federal court and that the creation of the district is an urgent necessity. It was also shown that in the past five years 143 cases have originated in Umatilla county in the same period, while but 54 cases have originated in Baker county in the same period.

It was decided at the meeting last night that a delegation be sent from this city to represent Pendleton's interests at Washington, and it is probable that within a few days a delegation of one or two men will be sent to the national capital to assist the Oregon delegation in making the best possible showing as to the logical headquarters for the new district.

Gold Studded Quartz.

An exhibit of nearly 100 pounds of quartz studded with gold, created quite a sensation in Greenhorn camp a day or so ago.

The ore was brought into camp by a Mr. Clark, who has charge of the J. W. Flegel mine near the well known Psyche property.

In running a cross-cut the ledge was cut five feet and no wall struck. Ore from the ledge was simply lousy with gold and its extent is not yet known. Those who saw the samples say the find is something phenomenal.—Baker City Democrat.
