After more than two years as local agent for the Pacific Express company L. F. Massee has resigned and by tomorrow will have taken up his new vocation in the Blue Mountain creamery, as shipping clerk.

Route Agent Birch is here today checking the retiring agent out, and the successor will be here tomorrow morning, according to present arrangements.

The new agent is R. C. Hite, formerly of Spokane. He is overdue here now, but it is believed that he will reach here this evening, and be introduced to his new office tomorrow morning.

IMPORTANCE OF SEED COLLECTION TO FARMERS

A matter which should receive the most careful attention on the part of the farmer is the matter of seed selection, says an O. A. C. bulletin. The utilization of cull potatoes, foul grain and grass for seeding purposes is, like the planting of low grade fruit trees, a serious mistake and one which always leads to unsatisfactory results. In short the success of any crop rests primarily in the character of the seed which we employ.

The influence of seed selection is well shown by consideration of the development and perfection of the sugar beet. The ordinary garden beet contains from 4 to 5 per cent of cane sugar. By careful selection of seed from exceptionally rich beets, the sugar content of the average beet delivered at the factory has been increased to 15 and 16 per cent, and individual beets are found with a sugar content of as high as 20 per cent.

At the Illinois station in the same way corn of high starch content, for the manufacture of starch, glucose and alcohol, and of high protein content for feeding, has been developed. At the Oregon station also a vetch with high protein content is being obtained by this process of selection.

The grade of a seed depends in the first place upon its vitality or power to germinate and secondly upon its purity or freedom from foreign seeds. The germinating power of the seed may be conveniently tested by placing a definite number of seeds between two layers of cotton flannel in an ordinary plate, moistening the flannel and inverting over this another plate to prevent evaporation. If kept in a warm place (70 or 80 degrees), after 4 to 6 days the germinated seeds may be counted and the percentage of germination determined.

The vitality of the seed is largely influenced by methods of curing, age, etc. Records show that only 3 per cent of a 10-year-old clover seed germinated, whereas 95 per cent of a good seed will grow. A large acreage of Alberta wheat was a complete failure last year, due to wheat fresh from the thresher being used for seed before it had properly cured.

Probably the greatest amount of adulteration occurs in the small grass seeds. At the Maine station as high as 16 per cent of foreign seeds were found in alfalfa and clover seed. These impurities are usually seeds of noxious weeds which by this means are carried far and wide. The presence of foreign seeds may be detected by pouring a small quantity of the seed to be tested on a piece of white paper and expanding with a small magnifying glass.

The purity standards of the United States require clover and alfalfa to be 98 per cent pure with a germination of 85 to 90 per cent. Oats and wheat 98 per cent pure, with a germination of 90 to 95 per cent. In foreign countries these standards are somewhat higher.
