IMPORTANCE OF SEED COLLECTION TO FARMERS

A matter which should receive the most careful attention on the part of west quarter of section 30, township the farmer is the matter of seed seutilization of cull potatoes, foul grain and grass for seeding purposes is, like the planting of low grade fruit trees, serious mistake and one which always leads to unsatisfactory results. In short the success of any crop rests primarily in the character of the seed which we employ.

The influence of seed selection is well shown by consideration of the development and perfection of the sugar beet. The ordinary garden beet contains from 4 to 5 per cent of cane sugar. By careful selection of seed from exceptionally rich beets, the sugar content of the average beet delivered at the factory has been increased to 15 and 16 per cent, and individual beets are found with a sugar content of as high as 20 per cent.
