NEW FEDERAL DISTRICT IS DOUBTFUL, SAYS ELLIS

Yesterday morning, the following letter was received by Pendleton parties, showing the present status of the new district bill:
 Washington, D. C., Feb. 15, 1908.
 Hon. T. C. Taylor,
 Pendleton, Oregon.
 My Dear Mr. Taylor: The telegram sent by yourself and other citizens of Pendleton came to hand in due time. I note what you say about the desire of our citizens to have the headquarters of the proposed eastern Oregon federal district located at Pendleton and it goes without saying that nothing would afford me more pleasure than to have a district located and Pendleton fixed as the place for holding the court.
 However, every time I appear before the committee having this matter in charge I am confronted with the statistics that the business of the present district, as they insist, is far less than that of many other districts which are not asking for an additional district.
 The economical fever stands very high here at present and it seems to be the purpose of each particular committee to keep all expenses, so far as legislation enacted from that committee is concerned, down to the very lowest possible amount.

I am urging this matter upon every suitable occasion, but, to speak candidly, I have much fear that if immediate action is insisted upon that we will get an unfavorable report from the house judiciary committee.
 I think the chances for its passage would be very much better at the short session of the present congress rather than the present one.
 However, if it is the desire of the people that this matter shall be pressed until consideration is had, I will do my duty along that line, let the result be what it may.
 I am very sorry that I cannot speak in more encouraging terms in regard to this measure, but candor prompts me to place the situation before you exactly as I see it.
 I am told that a committee from Baker City will be here shortly in regard to this measure. I am glad to have them come, for they can better realize the situation after having been on the ground and had a conference with the committee having the matter in charge.

NO BOOZE ABOARD.
Dry Precincts of Oregon Will Be Honored by O. R. & N. Company.
 That the O. R. & N. company is preparing to obey the local option law in Umatilla county is indicated by the fact that they have just secured a list of the dry precincts from the county clerks, relates the East Oregonian. At the request of the railroad people Deputy R. T. Brown has prepared a plat showing the five dry precincts of the county.
 Of the precincts where no liquor may be sold, three, North and South Milton and South Athena, are on the Spokane branch, while the other two, Ruddock and Encampment, are on the main line. It is understood that henceforth no drinks will be served in O. R. & N. buffet cars while trains are passing through the dry precincts. Consequently the porters will have to watch closely for precinct lines. This is the first recognition of the local option law by the O. R. & N., although the law has been in force for the past two years.

creamery butter were advanced last night from 40 to 45 cents. This increase was decided on because of the higher prices asked in Spokane, Seattle, Portland and the northwest generally.
 Quotations in the three principle cities were advanced about a week ago. Since that time the local company has been flooded with orders. Under the circumstances it was found necessary here in many instances to cut orders in two, sending half cases where full ones had been ordered.
 Many dealers throughout the state handle several kinds of butter. When any one of these varieties is offered for less than prevailing prices the demand for that one kind becomes almost universal among dealers. Single creameries are thus made recipients of more orders than they can fill. It was this condition that persuaded the officers of the Walla Walla creamery to raise their quotation.
