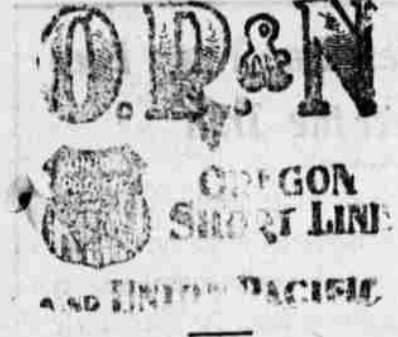

FIRST HOUSE IN GRANDE RONDE?

Our friend, Ben Brown's correction of Editor Huffman's statement that Mr. Leasy was the first settler of Grande Ronde valley, recalls to mind an error made by The Observer during the early years of its existence. It is worth recalling, together with the circumstances.

If we remember rightly, it was about the second year in the history of The Observer, that it went through the experience of all small offices, the desire to make illustrations. We sent away for a newly advertised "sure thing" process and after making the usual number of failures, finally made

a reproduction of a log cabin. After its completion, we conceived the idea of using it on an advertising blotter we had been getting out monthly, and inserting a line under it, "The first house in Grande Ronde valley." We scattered them broadcast through the city and valley towns. Within a few days one of the early pioneers called at the office, and noticing one of the blotters on our desk, complimented us on the correctness of the reproduction, and stated that he had often passed the cabin (we fortunately did not locate it), locating it just across the river, about where the Palmer mill now stands. In due time Uncle Ben Brown made us a friendly call and proceeded to show us that we were entirely wrong; that we did not even come close; that the first house erected was in La Grande, and was a two-story building. We even had the chimney on the wrong end. Backed up by the interview of our previous pioneer friend, we made an attempt to stand pat, but when "Uncle Ben" dug up his diary, we gracefully submitted, and from that date to this we have always given that diary right of way, and have been permitted to refer to it many times. It is fortunate that during the initial settlement of this valley and city, that Ben Brown kept a daily record. It should be carefully preserved, as it is the only accurate history of that epoch. But while this record is in the hands of Mr. Brown, any deviation from the actual facts will be carefully guarded. Brother Huffman, who was raised in this county and personally knows something of our early history, had better follow the policy of The Observer during the past many years, to be careful regarding the events within the dates kept by this diary.
