ALL FOR LA FOLLETTE

Strong Club Organized at Boise City to Boost for La Follette.

The Boise Capital News says of the organization of the La Follette club at that place Saturday night:

A permanent organization of the Idaho La Follette club was perfected last night in the council chambers of the city hall, when over 50 admirers of the Wisconsin senator assembled, adopted resolutions indorsing him for the presidency, elected officers and decided to put workers in the field throughout the county to boom his candidacy.

A preamble was added to the resolutions adopted to indorse the policies of President Roosevelt. It was also decided to place the membership fee at 50 cents per month during March and April and thereafter 25 cents. Regular meetings of the club will be held every two weeks in the city hall.

Following are the resolutions adopted:

Idaho republicans, believing in the principles of equal rights to all and special privileges to none, believing in a representative government, and having abounding faith in the ability and sincerity of Senator Robert M. La Follette, a man who has given his life to studying the needs and defects in our system of government, a man who has defended the cause of the people with that wonderful weight of convincing argument of which he is master, a man whose unselfish patriotism and unyielding integrity peculiarly fits him for the high position which he would fill with so much credit to himself and lasting honor and benefit to the nation, and believing that he represents and stands for the best interests of the people, that he comes nearer than any other to being the people's ideal candidate, that he is better fitted than any other to carry forward successfully the reforms promulgated by President Roosevelt, we pledge him our support and the use of all honorable means to promote his candidacy for the president of these United States in this locality, this county, this state and the nation.

Cornell and Penny to Meet.

Troy, N. Y., Feb. 25.—A two-mile relay race between the crack runners of Cornell and Pennsylvania will be the star event of the big athletic meet to be held at the state armory tomorrow night. This meeting will be especially interesting from the fact that Cornell defeated the University of Pennsylvania in a most sensational three-cornered relay race at the Boston Athletic association meet at Boston, Mass., making the remarkable time of seven minutes and fourteen seconds, which is four-fifths of a second short of the world's record held by Yale track team of 1905. Dartmouth was the third team in the race.
