Russians in Oregon and the Northwest Appeal for Financial Aid.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 26 .- (Special.) Representative business and professional men in various parts of the Inand Empire of the Pacific Northwest, formerly residents of Russia, are making canvasses for signatures in eastern Washington, northern Idaho, western Montana and northeastern Oregon for presentation to the trustees of the Spokane chamber of commerce orging that organization to use its good offices in an effort toward the revocation by the czar of the sentence imposed by the government upon General Stoessel as punishment for the surrender of Port Arthur during the Russo-Japanese war. The petition probably will be presented to the board at a meeting early in March, when it is purposed to begin a campaign to enlist the influence of every commercial club and business men's organization in the United States and Canada, George B.
