**BASEBALL
IN BAKER**

Jack O'Brien, the promoter of the proposed baseball league, was a visitor in our city yesterday, says the Democrat. Last evening a meeting was held in the office of Judge Currey for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not Baker will become a member of the league. Mr. O'Brien stated his proposition to those present, and all agreed that Baker should join the organization.

Mr. O'Brien has recently visited Walla Walla, Pendleton and La Grande and each of these cities are most enthusiastic over the prospects of good, fast baseball, at a very moderate expense.

His proposition is not only one that would furnish an excellent class of baseball, but one that will be self-supporting each year and not the old system of letting the expense of this popular amusement fall upon the shoulders of a few of our most enthusiastic citizens.

It may seem a trifle early to a majority of Baker fans, who do not understand that some time will be required in which to perfect the organization of the league, and it may not be out of place to mention that the other three towns are already at work signing players and arranging minor details.

Mr. O'Brien will return to Baker next Wednesday, at which time he will bring the proposition to a close and Baker City must make it known as to whether or not it will become a member of the league.

WILL NOT CHANGE SCORE.

Referee Clow Refuses to Consider Pendleton's Claims of Game.

Further proof that Pendleton high school won the basketball game here Saturday evening is supplied in the fact that the Walla Walla scorekeeper's book also shows Pendleton had been awarded the point that should have given the team the game at the close of the second half. When the score was footed up here Saturday the visiting score-keeper likewise neglected to add in the point.

But while Pendleton's claim to the game is complete, Referee Clow has refused to award the same to the Pendleton boys. In a 'phone conversation this morning he stated that under the rules his term as referee expired when the game closed, so he can take no further action.

In an interview with the Walla Walla Union this morning, Clow indulges in numerous falsehoods concerning the game and also makes some derogatory statements concerning Prof. Hampton and others connected with the Pendleton high school. Among the local students, basketball players and others, Clow is regarded as a "poor excuse" for they declare he is not only unfair as an official, but that he is dishonest personally. They declare he is not fit to be associated with school athletics as he is, and it is openly stated that Pendleton will have no further athletic relations with the Walla Walla high school until he goes out.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

The Walla Walla Union prints the following, which is referred to in the Pendleton paper:

Gave Fair Deal.

In a published report in a Pendleton paper, given ostensibly by members of the school, the statement that Coach Clow treated the Sunshine five unfairly and that after the second half ended in a tie he called repeated fouls on the Pendleton players in the hope of winning the game for Walla Walla. "How ridiculous the charges are," said Mr. Clow last night, "can be proved by a reference to the records of the game. In all there were but six fouls called on Pendleton, as against 18 or 20 on Walla Walla. I gave the teams as fair a deal as I possibly could. As for fouling Pendleton on the play-off, that too can be proved false by reference to the score card. There were but two fouls called, one on each side. To say that I called fouls repeatedly is, of course, wild and malicious exaggeration."
