NEW BAKER DEPOT.

Baker City Elated Over Probability of New Structure.

It is now assured that Baker City is to have one of the finest depots in Oregon, for the O. R. & N. company has taken up the matter and contemplates expending \$15,000 in erecting a new structure for the accommodation of the patrons in this city. Some time ago when the officials visited this city a delegation from the Citizens' league and the Business Men's association waited upon them and offered to donate the stone for the building if the company would erect it. W. J. Patterson has just received a letter from Mr. O'Brien in Portland, informing him that he had asked for an appropriation of \$15,000 for a building at Baker and with the stone donated by the citizens, the cost will probably total \$20,000. This is an improvement that the citizens have been seeking for many months.

Besides probably securing the new depot for Baker City the booster organizations have just completed a canvass in which they secured more than \$4000 to boost Baker City and county. This money will be spent in sending matter descriptive of this county to people in eastern states and many inquiries and replies are being received daily from the advertising which is being done.

The Citizen's league has taken up the offer of Portland to send a float representing this city and section of the country and in conjunction with the Business Men's association they will probably send a monster gold float to represent Baker county in the Rose carnival in June. The citizens of Baker are now awake to the golden opportunity which is open before us and they are taking advantage of every means of bringing to the outside world the advantages and wonderful resources of Baker county.—Baker City Herald.

Unite Social Forces.

New York, Feb. 27.—Hundreds of clergymen, labor leaders, socialists, sociologists and ethical and social workers assembled today for the first general conference of the League of Social and Ethical Forces. Bishop Greer is the presiding officer of the meeting, which was called at the Hotel Astor. The new body has been in process of formation for a year and has for its object the alliance of all the forces in the community which make for righteousness.

The creed of the new league, which is wide enough to admit to membership all humanitarians, whether Protestant, Catholic, Jew or agnostic, is as follows:

"This organization was prompted by the prevailing consciousness that the present separation between the forces that make for righteousness in this community involves great loss of power. By the bringing of representatives of the various ethical social interests into a fellowship of service, where personal acquaintance will be cultivated and knowledge and experience exchanged, separation and distrust will be overcome, and the ethical forces united in the support of measures which command the assent of all."
