### LENTEN PASTORAL.

"Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

Why? Because man is a religious being destined for immortality. His life is not to be measured by time, but by eternity. Temporal interests, however pressing and important, cannot make up the sum of his efforts. If they do, then he is courting havoc and disaster.

Lent is now at hand, when the Church raises her voice in solemn and affectionate warning, calling men to stop and take stock of themselves. Are they living according to the fundamental law of human life? While they may not be guilty of vice and debauchery, yet at the same time, they may be disregarding those essential conditions which alone can insure success in its truest sense. These conditions are tersely summed up in the text of Scripture quoted above. In other words, the guiding principle of human life is to "fear God and keep His commandments."

This Lenten warning is necessary for all. Not only to the man who is indulging his passions and vices and sinking lower and lower in the mire of sensuality, but also for those whose conduct appears respectable.

The man who is absorbed in business and ignores all his obligations of a religious nature, or the woman who is as conspicuous at the social function as she is inconspicuous in the House of God, are both in extreme danger because they are not directing the course of their lives according to the chart and compass of God's Holy Word. If too late, they find out their mistake, what will it profit the one that she had a whole household of bric-a-brac, trophies won at the bridge-whist table, or to the other, that he amassed a million dollars? Nor can they complain of unfair treatment, because they will be served as they themselves served their employees who proved unprofitable. It is simply a question of fitness. The law of God is to fit us for eternal life with all its illimitable and unrivalled opportunities for service under God. If, therefore, we ignore that law, how can we hope to be accepted?

Our Church does not, like some religious bodies, put certain amusement and luxuries under the ban because of the danger of their misuse and abuse. But this is not because she is lax, but because she places the responsibility where it rightly belongs on the individual. She instructs him in those principles which should govern his conduct and leaves the issue to his enlightened conscience and sanctified common sense. By so doing she respects the rights of the individual conscience and the individual liberty, which is the birthright of the Christian. But this method increases the personal responsibility of the individual, for which he will have to render an account.

As one appointed for that purpose I call on all those for whom I am responsible, to make the most of the Lenten opportunity. For some of us, it may be the last we shall enjoy. Let us then not forfeit the good and blessing it will bring. For as one of our own poets has said:  
Life is real! Life is earnest!  
And the grave is not its goal;  
Just thou art, to dust returnest,  
Was not spoken of the soul."

The week-day services will be Wednesdays at 4 p. m. and Fridays at 7:30 p. m.

In addition to the above Bishopaddock will hold special services on Monday, March 9, and the three following days. These will be a devotional hour each afternoon at 3 o'clock and each evening at 7:30.

Holy Week services to be announced later.
