BIG GAME ARRANGED

The official challenge issued in The Observer last evening from the basketball-on-skates team, has been accepted and team No. 2 has stepped into the limelight.

Harriman Gave Rebates.
Washington, March 4.—Officials of the department of justice and members of the interstate commerce commission are greatly interested in the investigation of rebating charges against the Southern Pacific railway, to be commenced tomorrow by the California state railroad commission.

Franklin K. Lane, of the interstate commerce commission, conducted an inquiry into Southern Pacific practices on the coast last October, and in his report, from the evidence adduced he found:

"The existence of an extensive system of preferential rates granted certain shippers on interstate business by the Southern Pacific company. The record discloses a list of 103 firms, corporations and individuals who enjoy what are known as special inside rates—less than the rates published to the general public—on the movement of certain designated traffic between points within the state of California.

"That such shippers paid the full rate published in the first instance and were allowed the refund on claims which went through the auditing department under instructions from the traffic department that such special rates should apply upon interstate shipments without tariff authority. That such funds amounted in various months of the years 1906 and 1907 to from \$30,000 to \$50,000 per month."

It was also alleged by Commissioner Lane that the rebates on state business were used as an inducement to large shippers to give the Southern Pacific their interstate shipments.

Buffalo Bow-Wow Exhibition.
Buffalo, N. Y., March 4.—Dog fanciers all over the United States and Canada are represented at the annual bench show of the Buffalo Kennel club, opened this morning. Buffalo's arena has come to be known as the great international battleground of the fanciers on both sides of the border, and this year the Buffalo club's offerings are far better than ever. Provision is made for 520 classes, a showing second only to New York, while almost 300 special prizes are offered, a list far surpassing any similar attraction by any club in America.

Hearing on Open Sunday.
Albany, N. Y., March 4.—A second hearing on the Stern Sunday Opening bill was conducted by the excise committee of the assembly. Several representatives of the liquor interests appeared in favor of the measure. The Stern bill aims to amend the excise law to allow saloons to open on Sunday between 1 and 11 p. m. A hearing on the Torrens system, before the joint committees of judiciary and general laws, was held in the senate
