# MAY VOTE ON SALARY

A Salem dispatch in the Oregonian says: Among other questions upon which the people of Oregon will vote at the coming June election is that of increasing the compensation of members of the legislature from \$120 to \$400 for the session. Assuming that regular sessions will consist of 40 days as in the past, the increase is from \$3 to \$10 per day. This amendment was proposed by the last legislature and has not received much attention from the general public.

The measure submitted is an amendment of section 29 of article 4 of the constitution, though by a clerical error the resolution adopted by the legislature describes the section as 28. In preparing the ballot title Attorney General Crawford mentioned this manifest error, so it cannot be afterward said that there was any misunderstanding as to the section affected. Whether the error will throw doubt upon the validity of the amendment, if adopted, is a purely legal question, probably made less serious by reason of the fact that the ballot will show the number of the section intended to be amended.

Section 29 as it now stands provides that the members of the legislature shall receive for their services a "sum not exceeding \$3 a day from the commencement of the session, but such pay shall not exceed in the aggregate \$120 for per diem allowance for any one session. When convened in extra session by the governor they shall receive \$3 per day, but no extra session shall continue for a longer period than 20 days. They shall also receive \$3 for every 20 miles they shall travel in going to and returning from their place of meeting on the most usual route. The presiding officers of the assembly shall, by virtue of their office, receive an additional compensation equal to two-thirds of their per diem allowance as members."

The presiding officers receive, therefore, \$5 per day or \$200 for the session. The mileage amounts to 15 cents per mile traveled. A member from Portland receives \$15.90 as mileage. A member from Jackson county receives about \$83 mileage, a member from Baker county \$122, and one from Curry, \$144 as mileage. The mileage allowance more than pays traveling expenses for one trip, but members from western Oregon counties and from eastern Oregon counties along the railroad usually make two or three trips home during the session, so that their mileage is more than used up. In the past members as a rule have traveled upon passes, so that unless they had to travel on stages or steamboats their mileage allowance was practically additional compensation.

### Cardinals Headed South.

Houston, Tex., March 4.—Manager McCloskey and his St. Louis cardinals are expected to pitch their tents here tomorrow for their season of spring training. They will play several exhibition games here, before returning to St. Louis on March 20 in time to play a series with the St. Louis Browns.

Philadelphia, March 4.—Ten events, in which some of the best athletes of the country are entered, make up the program of the dual meet between the Metropolitan Association of New York and the Middle Atlantic association here this evening.

Wichita, Kan., March 4.—A largely increased attendance marked the second day of the threshermen's convention, several thousand visitors being in the city. A theater party will be given for their benefit tonight.
