Uncle Sam Sues Dead Man.
Washington, March 4.—Uncle Sam is the plaintiff and William T. Collins, deceased, the defendant in a suit brought today. Collins was at one time pension agent for the government in the District of Columbia, and left behind him a shortage of \$49,525.06. The suit has been pending for over 30 years.

The title of the suit is The United States vs. William T. Collins. The present action is to collect from the executors of two of the eight of Collins' sureties the amount that an investigation showed he was short.

Collins was pension agent for the District of Columbia from 1869 to 1872, and left office under a cloud. Succeeding investigation showed he was short \$49,525.06. He was promptly sued by the government. He left the jurisdiction and evaded throughout life service of papers by deputy United States marshals.

The government instituted suits against his sureties who had gone on his bond of \$100,000, but never realized anything from six of them, and finally sued the surviving two sureties, Robert Boyd and William H. Slater, both now deceased.

The case went to trial. A verdict was in favor of Boyd and Slater, but the trial judge granted a new trial. At the second trial the jury returned a verdict again in favor of the two sureties. When the case was taken to the court of appeals, however, the verdict was reversed.

The case for some years has apparently been forgotten, but will be revived by the suit instituted today.

The suit names George W. Evans disbursing clerk of the Interior Department, as the executor of the estate of Robert Boyd, and George E. V. E. Slater, executor of the estate of his father, William H. Slater, as the parties in their capacity as executors who should make good the shortage.

Harriman Rebate Inquiry.

San Francisco, March 4.—E. H. Harriman's railroad methods will again be subjected to a searching inquiry when the California railroad commission meets tomorrow to resume its hearing of the 4000 cases of rebate charged against the Southern Pacific railroad.

In the opinion of Commissioner Sumnerland of Los Angeles, the hearing will occupy much time.

"There will be much evidence," he said, "and many witnesses, postponements and delays, and several lawyers representing the different parties. I think the investigation may take months. But, knowing that this investigation is to be made, every individual in the state who has any evidence to offer or any kick to make should come forward or be represented at this time. We simply sit as a board of judgment. The Traffic Association and dissatisfied shippers should present their charges; the railroad should make answer."

"We will contend that there has been no discrimination against any shipper," said Peter Dunne, attorney for the road. "All the refunding which has been done has been on account of competitive or local conditions, and each shipper has enjoyed the same privilege in the matter. We have offered every facility to the railroad commission in examining our books and records, and we are ready now to proceed with the hearing."

To Call on President.

Washington, March 4.—Delegates from the American Lumbermen's association, which has a membership of 60, and represents a capital of \$200,000,000, will be given a reception at the White House tomorrow by President Roosevelt. John M. Hastings, of Pittsburg, is president of the body. Arrangements for the reception were made by Representative Burke.

Chicago, March 4.—Stockholders of the National Dairy Show association met here today, and will decide when and where the next show will be held.

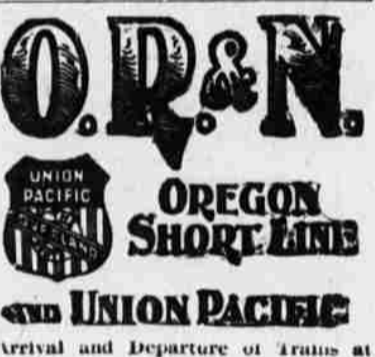
