ABOUT \$600 DAMAGES

Engine No. 199, which went into the ditch near Pendleton yesterday morning, will be taken to the Albina shops for repairs as soon as the wrecking crew, which is still on the scene, straightens out the wreck. Division Foreman Wtason, who was with the crew yesterday, returned this morning and reports that the crew will complete the work this afternoon some time and probably reach La Grande late this evening.

The engine itself is damaged but little, and \$600 will cover the entire damage to the locomotive complete. When the engine rolled over, it rested parallel with the main line, and cleared the tracks about 18 inches. This was sufficient to allow the rest of the train to pass later. The tank and dead-head baggage car, however, were what gave the most trouble to the wrecking crew, and it is the tank that sustained the heaviest damage. The tank broke loose from the engine and rested crosswise of the track. The baggage car did the same thing. Some effectual work was done by the wrecking crew. The tank was righted and placed on blocks, and the car was picked up between the hours of 10:20 and 2:30 o'clock.

The tank will be loaded on a flat car and taken to Albina, while the engine itself will be righted today and traileed to the shops.

Buy Bingham Springs.
J. A. Borie, the well known plunger, resident of this city, today closed the purchase of the Bingham Springs sanitarium, summer resort and timber land, consisting of the hotel buildings, springs, grounds and 800 acres of land, six miles from Bingham Springs station, on the O. R. & N. The price is not made public, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Mr. Borie has been in charge of the property for the past 10 days, while minor details of the deal were being attended to and today the papers were signed and the transfer made.

Mr. Borie will begin at once to make a large number of improvements and repairs and hopes to be able to place the property in a more attractive condition and with this end in view has ordered lumber and shingles with which to repair the buildings.

While he will not be able to carry out all of his plans this year, yet he hopes to entirely change the appearance and environment of the popular resort and will make it one of the leading recreation grounds of the northwest.

He hopes this year to be able to improve the road by which automobiles will be able to reach the springs; he will build a new bridge to the swimming pool; will renovate and repair the buildings and hopes to install an electric light plant by which the entire grounds and all the buildings may be lighted.
