Eastern Oregon Looks Good.
J. B. Good, superintendent of agencies for the Union Meat company, has returned from an extended trip through the cattle and sheep districts of eastern Oregon, visiting Pendleton, La Grande, Baker City and other cattle shipping points, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Mr. Good's trip was made for the purpose of looking into the condition of the spring beef cattle that will be shipped from the eastern Oregon feeding ranches to the Portland market during the next two months. Thousands of grain and alfalfa-fed steers are now being driven from the interior to the shipping points and will later be shipped to the Portland and Seattle packing houses.

ANXIOUS TO LEARN MORE

"The vast increase of inquiries from people seeking homes and employment in the northwest, together with information contained in communications received from immigration agents of the railroads, indicate that there will be several trains come to Spokane every week within the next few months, taking advantage of the low colonist rates, which went into effect," said L. Monroe, secretary of the chamber of commerce, in an interview.

"Illustrating the growing increase of requests for information, the record kept by the chamber of commerce of the number of inquiries received and answered shows that in January the total was 1270, while during February the total was 2312, a gain of 1042.

"In January inquiries came from every state except from Delaware, and from all the territories except from Alaska and Hawaii. Inquiries were also received from Canada, England, Germany, Holland, Mexico, Panama, Australia, Argentina, Belgium and France.

"Among the states the record for January shows Massachusetts in the lead with 201 inquiries, Illinois in second place with 91 inquiries; Iowa third with 85; Minnesota fourth with 73, and New York next in order with 72.

"The majority of the inquiries came from the middle western states the greatest number from that section being from Indiana, Kansas and Nebraska. From Canada the largest number came from British Columbia and Alberta.

"These were principally from people seeking homesteads on Indian reservations or farm lands in Spokane or Stevens counties.

"During February Illinois led in the number of inquiries with 212; Iowa was next with 173, followed by Minnesota with 116, and Pennsylvania with 104. There was an increase of four in January over the inquiries received from the Canadian provinces in the preceding months, and in addition there were two from Switzerland, two from Ireland, three from Holland four from England and one from Porto Rico.

"With regard to the class of inquiries those received in February show a greater diversity than in any other month for several years. The homestead locations, farm lands and opportunities for employment as common laborer, in clerical positions and a farm hands. There were a great many inquiries made for small fruit tracts.

"Among the peculiar inquiries was one from a California man, who wanted to know if we had fleas in the inland empire. Another man wanted to know what advantages this section had to offer to a coffin factory. Several asked information concerning a location for a bank, while others wanted to learn of a good opening for dry goods stores, novelty stores, an ornamental iron factory, a flatiron plant and a small cracker factory; one man desires to start a factory for the manufacture of wooden legs, and a Minnesota man is seeking a location for a hog farm. An inquirer in the middle west is looking for a tract of 7000 acres for a colonization scheme, and three Nebraska men want locations for the optical business.

"A very large per cent of the people announced in their communications their intention to take advantage of the low rates which is now in effect. In addition to answering these letters the Chamber of Commerce has distributed 300 pieces of literature in Massachusetts, 500 in Minnesota and 450 in Wisconsin through railroad and immigration agents. Of the Inland Empire excursion, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce, 8860 pamphlets and books were distributed through Oregon and California."
