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REDS PLAN BIG CHICAGO MEETING

EMMA GOLDMAN LAUGHS AT DEPORTATION PLAN.

Trouble is Predicted for Chicago Tonight When Announced Meeting of Reds Will Be Broken Up—Emma Goldman Will Speak—The Female Anarchist Has No Sympathy for the Murdered Priest at Denver, But Her Heart Bleeds for Averbuch.

Chicago, March 6.—Emma Goldman, the anarchist, announced today that she will speak at a meeting tonight. The woman anarchist says talk of deporting her is all "rot." She stated today that she did not feel sorry over the death of Father Heinrichs in Denver, but she did feel bad over Averbuch, the would-be assassin of Shippy, Chicago's chief of police, who shot Averbuch dead.

"That was a cruel murder," she said, in relation to Shippy's act in killing the man.

Serious Trouble in Sight.

Serious trouble is likely to result tonight if the "Reds" attempt to hold a meeting here. An attack on President Roosevelt in an article said to have been written by Emma Goldman, has come to the knowledge of the police, and as a result feeling is running high against the "Reds" here. Miss Goldman is under surveillance by secret service men. So far no authentic copy of the article has been secured as it was only written for certain members of the band.

To Study Mortgage Methods.

New York, March 6.—Vice President Frank Bailey of the Title Guaranty & Trust company will sail for Europe tomorrow and while abroad will make an exhaustive study of the Credit Foncier and French methods of lending money on real estate. Mr. Bailey declares that real estate mortgages are better investment in times of financial trouble than so-called

"conservative securities."

"I hope," said Mr. Bailey, "that as a result of existing conditions the managers of the great trust funds, such as life insurance companies and savings banks, will come to see that part of their duty is to help and aid the thrifty people to obtain a home and will give them the same rate of interest as the man who wishes to borrow \$100,000. If there is any one thing that the city of New York needs it is a greater number of home owners, but if each home owner must borrow where he can at any old rate, paying more interest than the fellow who wishes to borrow \$100,000 or \$200,000, then the managers of trust funds are not doing their duty."

11 SURVIVORS ARE RESCUED

JAPANESE SAILORS WERE IN SERIOUS CONDITION.

Eleven Starving Survivors of the Crew on Japanese Vessel Satsu Maru Are Rescued by American Revenue Cutter—Were Desperate and About to Take Sure-Death Journey in Indian Dugout—Were Stranded on Beach North of Cape Manby.

Sitka, Alaska, March 6.—The United States revenue cutter Thetis has rescued 11 surviving members of the crew on the Japanese vessel Satsu Maru from the beach seven miles north of Cape Manby. They will be brought to Seattle.

The rescue was accomplished just when the men were getting desperate and were about to embark in a forlorn hope of reaching Yakutat, a village 16 miles across the bay, in a small Indian dugout which drifted on the beach near their camp.

ANTI-BAILEY CONVENTION

TEXAS BAILEY WILL BE FOUGHT TO FINISH.

His Enemies in Texas Will Insist That He is Not Sent to Denver as a Delegate at Large—Convention Tomorrow Will Fight Against the Baileyisms Which Are Considered by Them as Evil—The "Big Four" Seem Likely to Win.

Dallas, Texas, March 6.—Political enemies of United States Senator Bailey will hold a convention in Waco tomorrow, as the result of a call issued by Chairman George W. E. Riddle of the Democratic club of Texas.

The state purpose of the convention is to take steps to prevent United States Senator Bailey from being sent to the national convention at Denver, as a delegate at large and "to fight against the evils in political and official life which have come to be generally grouped under the name of Baileyism."

The Bailey adherents are also active and the senator is being boomed as one of the four delegates at large from Texas to the national democratic convention at Denver. Many of them are advocating making up the "Big Four" as follows: United States Senators Charles A. Culberson and J. W. Bailey, Governor T. M. Campbell and State Chairman George A. Carden.

There seems to be little doubt that these four names will be presented by the Bailey men at the state convention in Fort Worth on May 26.

\$5000 for His Soul.

Topeka, Kan., March 6.—Declaring that the salvation of his immortal soul has been jeopardized because of the refusal of the Rev. H. C. Senne to accept him as a member of his church Martin Bergman has brought suit against the clergyman and places the damages at \$5000.

BURIAL OF DEAD CHILDREN STARTS

REVISED DEATH LIST GIVES 161 FATALITIES.

Mass Will Be Held for the Dead Children of the Collinwood School Tomorrow—Protestants Hold Memorial Services Monday—Bodies Taken to Other Towns—German Press Criticizes American Carelessness—Twenty-Eight Unidentified.

Cleveland, O., March 6.—The revised list of pupils who were burned to death in the Collinwood fire, places the number at 161, with 23 unidentified.

The first funerals of children who were lost in the disaster will be held today. A requiem mass for the dead will be celebrated in St. Joseph's church tomorrow morning, and on Monday general memorial services will be held in all the Protestant churches. Several bodies have been taken to other towns for burial.

Fire Causes Criticism.

Berlin, March 6.—The German press sharply criticizes American methods as shown in the result of the Collinwood fire. They also comment sarcastically on the cheapness with which human life is held in America.

Troops Leave Goldfield.

Washington, March 6.—According to advice received here, the United States troops which have been stationed at Goldfield, Nev., for some time, will break camp and return to San Francisco tomorrow, the newly organized Nevada state police now being ready for duty.

White Plague Sanitarium.

Albuquerque, N. M., March 6.—Plans are being made for the erection here, at a cost of \$1,000,000, of a great sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis, by the Presbyterian church of the United States.

INVESTIGATED O. R. & N. WRECK

CITIZENS AND OFFICIALS LOOK OVER SITUATION.

Track and Engine Found to Have Been in Normal Condition—Engine Truck Wheels Left Rails at Point 1800 Feet West of Yreck—Junction Switch Caused Other Wheels to Leave Track and Caused the Wreck.

Pendleton, March 5.—A committee of citizens of Pendleton, consisting of Robert Forster, W. L. Thompson and Bert Huffman, was invited by O. R. & N. officials to accompany them to the scene of the Pilot Junction wreck yesterday morning for the purpose of assisting in the investigation of the causes of the wreck.

The party consisting of Superintendent D. W. Campbell, Division Engineer William Bollons, General Master Mechanic J. F. Graham, Master Mechanic J. T. Langley and Division Roadmaster H. Jurgens, and the three Pendleton men mentioned, left for the scene of the wreck on an extra train and spent the entire forenoon looking over the situation.

A careful inspection of the engine and track was made and the officials assisted in the investigation in every way, answering questions and making explanations of the rules of the road and track conditions and by giving information as to the operation of trains and engines on the system.

It was found by the committee that the track was in excellent condition and the engine showed no sign of having a defect in the wheels or otherwise before the wreck occurred. The engine truck wheels left the rail on a 10-degree curve 1900 feet west of where the engine was finally wrecked and at the point where the truck wheels left the rail that was absolutely nothing to

cause a wreck, the ties, rails, bolts and spikes being in normal condition and the gauges and levels used on the track showed that the gauge was proper, the elevation of the track correct and the rails in excellent condition.

The cause of the wreck is a mystery and while neither the officials nor the committee of citizens desire to censure any one unjustly, the consensus of opinion was that the speed was perhaps greater at that point than the employes realized and that the lurch of the engine in rounding the curve caused the wheels of the truck to leave the rail.

Had the derailed wheels not have struck the switch at the Pilot Rock junction, it is possible that the train would have run into Pendleton with the one pair of wheels on the ties, but the switch caused the other wheels to leave the track and caused the wreck.

CONTRACT FOR 410 ADDITIONAL ACRES

SUGAR COMPANY HAS MANY NEW CONTRACTS.

Total Number of Acres Which Will Be Cultivated by Amalgamated Sugar Company this Year Will Reach Close to 2500 Mark by Reason of New Contracts Made—Release Portion of Experiment Farm—Representatives Working With Farmers.

Contracts for the lease of 410 acres of land in this valley to be used for beet growing purposes have just been closed by the Amalgamated Sugar company. This acreage has not been devoted to beet growing and represents the increased acreage, or a part of it, that the company will cultivate this year above last year. Aside from the 410 acres mentioned, it has released 160 acres from the Union county experiment station, but this amount was leased last year and is not classed among the acres that have been added to the company's vast fields.

In Five Tracts.

The contracts were closed with five parties, namely: the Hanson ranch of 60 acres, the Gekeler ranch of 50 acres, the Walter Pierce, home farm, 4 acres, the James Hutchinson ranch and the William Hutchinson ranch near Union, the former 160 and the latter 40 acres. With what fields the company expects yet to contract for, the total beet acreage will be brought close to the 2500 mark this season.

Still Canvassing.

Representatives of the company are still canvassing the valley for individual growers. They are meeting with success.

"The Merry Widow" on Canal.

Panama, March 6.—With the arrival here of an American orchestra supplied by the government to furnish music for the canal workers, "The Merry Widow" has made her debut on the zone, and the big ditch will now be dug to that merry tune.

TACOMA POLITICS AT ACUTE STAGE

MAYOR AND HIS OPPONENT WILL APPEAR IN PUBLIC.

The Mayor, Backed by Regular Police, and His Opponent Candidate, Aided by Deputies, Will Appear in Theater, Where the Latter Will Reiterate Charges of Graft Against Mayor Wright—Use Force if Deputies Prevent Free Speech Privilege.

Tacoma, March 6.—A serious clash may occur tonight at the Tacoma theater, when Mayor Wright, backed by a squad of police, will meet candidate Charles Drury, with his force of deputies, and Drury will again reiterate his charges of graft against the mayor. He declares his deputies will not allow the mayor to break up the meeting.

Wright asserts he will answer any charges Drury makes. He says he relies on fair play to give him that. His police will be used only if the deputies try to stop him from talking.

Governor Addresses Y. M. C. A.

Grand Forks, N. D., March 6.—Governor John Burke will be the principal speaker at the opening session this evening of the convention of the North Dakota Young Men's Christian associations. Many delegates arrived today and the rally, which will extend through tomorrow and Sunday, promises to be one of the most noteworthy ever held in the northwest.

Would Save the Toads.

Columbus, O., March 6.—A movement for the preservation of the lowly toad has been inaugurated by Professor A. C. Pharyo-Gage, landscape artist, who declares that the ugly little animals, by destroying insects, are preservers of plant and animal life and conservators of the public health.

Appeal in Kaufmann Case.

Sioux Falls, S. D., March 6.—Legal steps toward the hearing of the appeal in the case of Mrs. Emma Kaufmann, wife of a millionaire brewer of this city, who is charged with the murder of Agnes Polreis, a 16-year-old domestic, have been taken by the attorneys for the accused woman.

Mexican Country Club.

City of Mexico, March 6.—The Cuernavaca Country club, one of the most ambitious organizations of this kind in the republic, will be inaugurated tomorrow with a golf tournament. Special trains will be run to carry the crowds from this city.

Salmon Crop to Be Short.

Seattle, Wash., March 6.—Packers say that the price of canned salmon will soon begin to soar skyward, as the indications are that the 1908 pack will be shortest in years. A big pack is expected in 1909, as the fish run in schools every four years.
