IDLE MEN IN PARADE

New York, March 6.—New York police officials are preparing for trouble such as was recently experienced in Philadelphia, when the "army of the unemployed" in the metropolis attempted to hold a great demonstration in City Hall park tomorrow afternoon. It is expected that a small army of police, both mounted and foot, will be on hand in case the demonstration is carried out on a large scale and will use harsh measures to put down any move toward rioting.

Members of the executive committee of the Unemployed Conference of New York, who assert that they represent 150,000 men who are out of work, insist that the demonstration will be carried out in a peaceful manner and that the only object is to urge upon the city, state and federal officials the immediate necessity of starting public works for relief.

The Central Federated Union, representing union labor in New York, has refused to give its sanction to the demonstration. Conservative labor leaders declare that the movement is a political scheme to further the interests of the socialists and their chosen leader, William D. Haywood. It is rumored that Haywood will address the meeting of the unemployed tomorrow.

In their appeal to the unemployed to take part in tomorrow's demonstration, the promoters of the movement say: "This unemployed conference has been called together in view of the industrial depression now existing, which is causing want and suffering to hundreds of thousands of working people in this city and to millions throughout the country. Its purpose is to demand and use all means to procure measures for the relief of these sufferings, and, at the same time, to promote a correct understanding of the causes of such industrial depressions so that their recurrence may be prevented in the future.

"The conference recognizes that measures of immediate relief are imperatively necessary. The conference therefore calls upon all labor organizations to give it prompt and energetic support in inaugurating a great, systematic and aggressive popular demand upon the mayor and board of aldermen of the city, upon the governor and legislature of the state, and upon the president and congress of the United States, that these public authorities use the law-making and taxing powers to the following ends:

"First, to undertake useful public works upon a large scale and thus give employment to those thrown out of work in private industry, such work not to be done by contract, but under a system of direct employment by the city, state and nation, so that all the moneys appropriated shall go to the workers and none to useless middlemen, and all such work to be done under union conditions as to hours of labor and wages, so that the general standard of living may be raised rather than lowered by such public employment.

"Second, at the same time to enact and enforce such legislation as will abolish child labor and establish a general work day of not more than eight hours, thus reducing the competition in the labor market and distributing employment to a larger number of persons, while also saving the working people from the crying evils which result from the exploitation of little children and from excessive labor for adults."

Strikebreakers for Alaska.
Seattle, Wash., March 6.—Hundreds of men are being sent from here to Fairbanks, Alaska, on specially chartered vessels, to be employed as strikebreakers in the labor war carried on by the mine operators against the Western Federation of Miners.
