### A REPLY TO "MR. TAXPAYER."

led myself to believe that your intentions were just, but your ignorance was at fault. Let's see about this salary business, and do a little figuring ourselves, with the public:

Chief of police, \$85; night marshal, \$75; extra marshal, \$75; water superintendent, \$95; pump man, \$75; recorder, \$90; poundmaster, \$60; attorney, \$33.33; street superintendent, \$75; a total of \$653 per month, or \$7,836 per year, were they all employed monthly, but the extra marshal works about four months and the pump man eight or nine months out of each year, making a total expense of about \$7,000 on the actual salary list.

"The mayor has favored no great measure." Let's see. Did the mayor favor the Beaver creek project? Is it a great measure? Did the father of this article (he's only an adopted pa) favor that measure? Now, Mr. Taxpayer, you that I favored, do favor and always have used my best energies toward securing this supply of pure water, and, as a matter of spite work, because it was a pet measure of mine, your interest defeated the new charter and thereby prevented our getting a good and sufficient supply of pure, wholesome water for our citizens to use. Still you cry "Look at the muddy streets, filthy and disease-producing water," etc. Have you any conscience? I say No! For it was those of your ilk that prevented this great undertaking. You say that the mayor is too vacillating in his policies, and refer to my vote on the high license ordinance. You say that I voted against the \$900 ordinance as being too high. Not at all, it was too low. I did vote against the Finn ordinance because it was too radical and would have put the saloons out of business—not a province of six or eight men, but a matter that should be left to a vote of the people. You say that I am negligent as a public officer because a mayor pro tem signed a few warrants. Was I mayor pro tem? You know I was not, but you insinuate that I was, and try by your misleading statements to lead the public to believe that I was acting in that capacity. This warrant was issued as a rebate on liquor license, and as there was another man already paying license for the privilege of running a saloon at the same place, the council deemed it right and proper that this man should receive back the money paid, for which he was receiving no benefits. This precedent had been followed on many occasions since. A warrant of \$125 was voted to assist in entertaining the Odd Fellows during their grand lodge meeting in La Grande, but as the grand lodge had sufficient funds the city was never called on for this or any other amount, consequently this warrant was never issued. You make reference to the \$25,000 bonds voted to erect the city hall. Was this money judiciously handled? If there is any one thing that I am proud of as a city official, it is the fact that the ways and means committee, of which I was a member, handled the construction of this building and that the taxpayers got more than value received for their money. This committee negotiated for the installing of the heating plant for this same building, and no one denies the fact that we got value received for the outlay; not \$4,000 as you insinuate the committee may have pocketed. Do we, or did the city ever pay \$15 per month for arc lights, as you boldly proclaimed to the public? Is it not a fact that the city contract was for \$8 per month instead of \$15, a difference of nearly 100 per cent? In this connection I may say that the city is now entering into a contract at \$6 per month for arc lights, to go into effect as soon as the company resumes operation. Incandescents at \$3 per month. I presume this was a "four-candle power," too. Why don't you be specific in your charges and not merely skim the surfaces just because you think you can fool the people. I want to say right here, that during my time in the council an expense was never created nor a cent spent on a warrant drawn that was not authorized by the council, for good and legitimate purposes. During my tenure in office the council has been made up of good, conservative business men, and during that time you cannot find a single instance in which an official tried to graft the city. For any other facts in this matter I call your attention to the financial statement of the city, which appears in this issue of the Evening Observer. With this record behind me, I leave myself in the hands of the voters to decide whether or not they approve of civic improvement and moral upbuilding of our progressive little city.
