MARKET DAY A SUCCESS

It is estimated that 400 outside people attended the third market day held in this city today and the sales were the most successful and interesting yet held, states the Pendleton East Oregonian.

About \$5000 worth of property, mostly livestock, was sold at good prices and the bidding was the most spirited and active seen at any of the sales. The auction started at 10 o'clock this forenoon and during the forenoon all the buggies, wagons, hacks and other smaller articles were sold, leaving the livestock for the afternoon.

When 1 o'clock arrived and Col. J. M. Bentley, as auctioneer, announced that the sale was on, over 50 head of horses, mares and jacks were listed with Clerk Lee Moorhouse. All of the stock listed at this sale was of large size and extraordinary quality and the prices were high from the start.

Some excellent teams were sold during the afternoon and some of the best colts ever offered at any of the market day sales were disposed of at good prices. Owing to the fact that the sale did not close until after time of going to press it is impossible to give a detailed list of either the stock or the prices received.

FARMERS PLEASED WITH TRAIN

C. F. Vandewater Tells of Trip on the Demonstration Train in Palouse.

C. F. Vandewater returned yesterday from Pullman, where he accompanied the demonstration train run by the O. R. & N. railway company from that city through the principal wheat growing sections of the Palouse country. This train was in charge of instructors from the state college at Pullman, who made talks at the principal stopping places on the trip with a view of persuading the farmers to raise a forage crop on their summer fallow land, and in this way increase the productive value of the land practically 100 per cent.

In speaking of the excursion last night, Mr. Vandewater said that it was a success in every particular, and that the farmers seemed well pleased with the ideas advanced by the demonstrators on the train.—Walla Walla Union.

STRUCK QUICKSAND.

180,000 Required to Make One Fill Opposite The Dalles.

It has cost about the big sum of 180,000 to date to make the one fill at the north bank road near the old building erected for a box factory across the river. The fill is supposed to rest on a bed of quicksand and keeps sinking. The earth next to the river continues to bulge up from the sheer force of the weight of the fill above on the quicksand or whatever it is that causes the trouble. This fill could have been avoided by making the curve farther back, but the company making the road were determined to have as few curves as possible, so no doubt the fill will be "filled" after a while, but it will consume a lot of money.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Notice of Street Improvement.

To Whom it May Concern:

Notice is hereby given that by a resolution duly passed, the common council of the city of La Grande has ordered the following described portions of the street hereinafter named, to be improved by constructing cement sidewalks on and along the same as follows: That a cement sidewalk seven feet wide be constructed on Depot street from its intersection with Fourth street to the south line of the Mahafey brick building; also a cement sidewalk seven feet wide on Fourth street along lot 4, in block 193, in Chaplin's addition to La Grande; also cement sidewalks, 12 feet wide, along lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 9, in block 108, and on the east side of Elm street, from Washington avenue to Adams avenue; also along the north side of Adams avenue, from Chestnut street to Fourth street; and along the west side of Fir street, from the north side of Jefferson avenue to the south track of the O. R. & N. Co.

All of said walks to be built at the expense of the owners of the property abutting on said portions of said streets according to the specifications of ordinance No. 307, series 1905, and under the supervision of the street commissioners, and to be completed not later than July 1, 1908.

Notice is also given that any of said work and improvement not done by the property owners by said July 1st, will be done by the city and the cost of doing said work made a lien on the property abutting on the street so improved by the city as aforesaid. That any remonstrance against said improvements or any part thereof, must be presented to the city recorder within 10 days after the date hereof. La Grande, Oregon, March 6, 1908.
