LANE'S ACCUSERS ARE SENTENCED

WOULD-BE REPUTATION SPOILERS SENTENCED.

E. E. Radding is Given Six Months in Prison for Conspiring Against the Character of Mayor Lane in Port- land—His Accomplice, Mrs. Way- mire, Given Four Years—Both Are Given Stay of Proceedings to Perfect Appeal—Bonds Reduced.

Portland, March 10.—E. E. Rad- ding and Mrs. Belle Waymire, recently convicted of attempting to blacken the reputation of Mayor Lane by ar- ranging to build up a case of "assault" against Lane, were sentenced this morning.

Radding was given six months in the county jail and Mrs. Waymire was sentenced to four years. Their stay of proceedings was granted the defendants in order to perfect their appeal. During the hearing, Mrs. Waymire's bail was reduced from \$1,000 to \$100.

WANT LIFE OF KING HAakon

Christiania, Norway, March 10.—A daring attempt was made today to as- sassinate King Haakon, when 10 rifle shots were fired through a window of the royal palace into a room which was supposed to be occupied by his majesty. The king and royal family escaped by a narrow margin.

The conspirators gained access to the palace garden disguised as labor- ers. From this position they opened fire with sawed-off carbines and

weapons. Servants heard the shoot- ing and captured three of the men. Fifty rounds of ammunition were found.

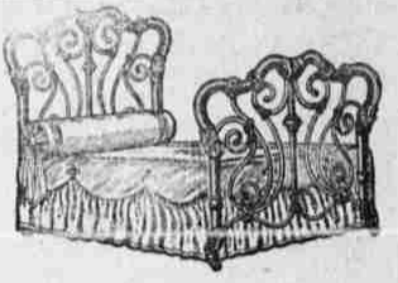
