PREPARING AN APPEAL

David Coon who, on Monday was tried before Justice O. T. Severs, and sentenced to serve a term of eight months in the county jail for the larceny of a fur overcoat, was brought over yesterday. Freight Rates Rain Trade.
Complaint has been made to the railroad commission by H. S. Gile & Co. of this city, that the Southern Pacific company has unwarrantedly raised the rates on citrus fruits from San Francisco during the past year from 40c to 69c, and from Portland for the same commodity from 16c to 25c, and on sweet potatoes from 10c to 19c. Gile & Co. claim these increases have practically ruined their trade in California citrus fruits.— Eugene Guard.

BALL GAME INTERESTING

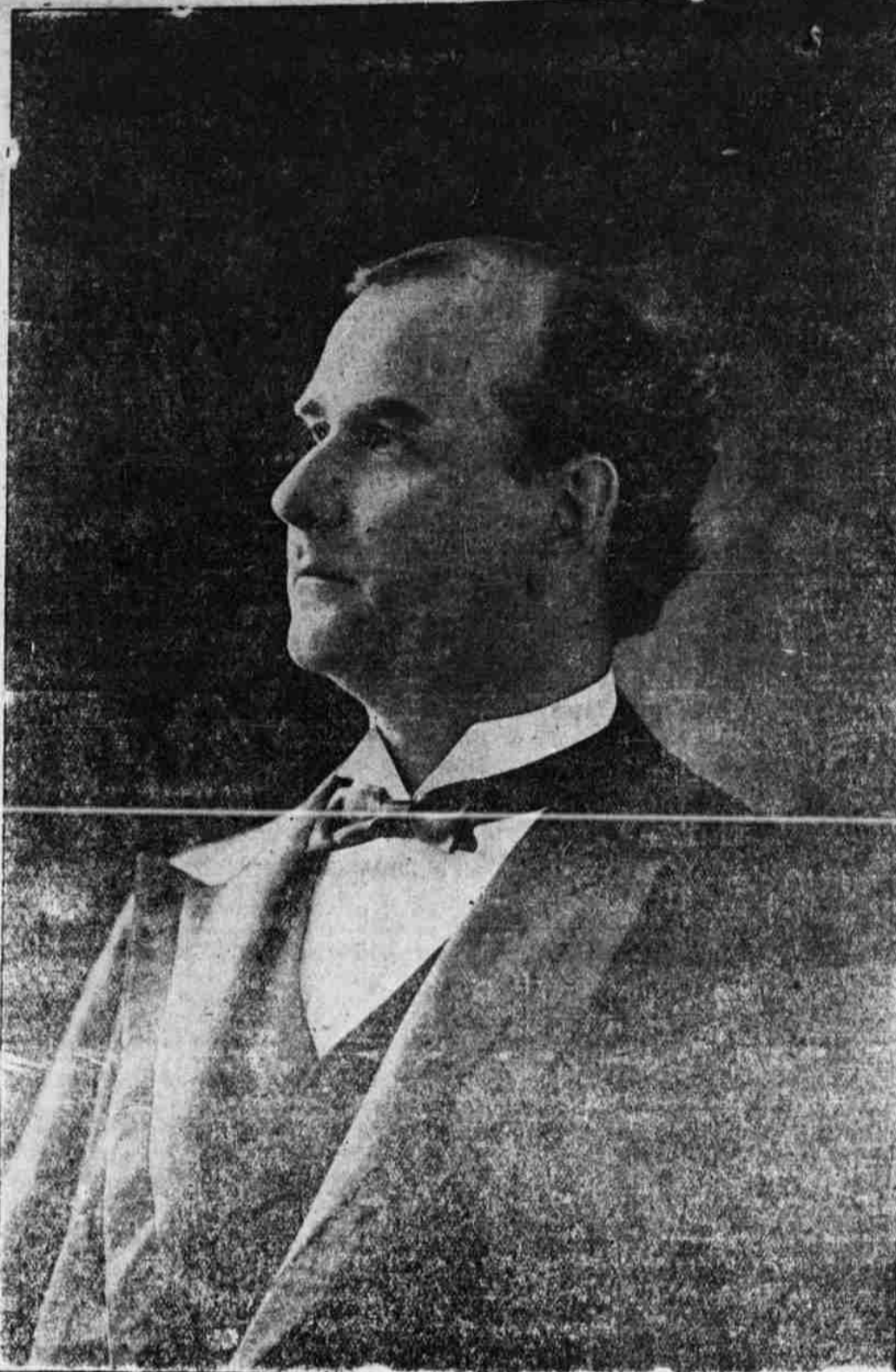

STILL MORE IMPROVEMENTS

H. B. Smith, a draughtsman from St. Louis, is now employed in the La Grande Iron works, designing a large trip-hammer, to be added to its already splendid equipment. When completed the machine will drop its 150-pound hammer at the rate of from 100 to 175 taps per minute. Mr. Smith states that when in operation the hammer will give due notice when it is working, and it will be able to make a noise sufficient to drown an entire battery of common anvils. The capacity will permit of iron and steel being worked as large as six inches square. It will be entirely home-made—designed and manufactured in the shops.

Want Teachers in the Philippines.
Washington, March 11.—Three hundred teachers are needed in the Philippines, and civil service examinations are being held today in cities throughout the country in an attempt to fill the vacancies. The examinations are open to both men and women, but examine applicants will not be accepted unless they have male relatives, present or prospective, in the islands. The salaries range from \$1000 to \$2,000, and promotions are rapid.

Oklahoma Republican Convention.
Oklahoma City, Okla., March 11.—Delegates from all the 75 counties of the new state assembled here today in the first republican state convention held since Oklahoma was admitted to the union. The convention consists of 140 delegates. Taft adherents are apparently in control and appearances indicate that the secretary of war will be endorsed, although not without a fight.

Nebraskans Cheer Roosevelt.
Omaha, Neb., March 11.—Wild cheers greeted every mention of President Roosevelt in the Nebraska republican convention, in session here today. A well organized movement

to endorse the president for a third term has been set on foot by some of the delegates, but it is likely that Secretary Taft will be endorsed by the convention.

More Money for Osages.
Guthrie, Okla., March 11.—An annuity payment of \$100 per capita is being made this week to the Osage Indians by Indian Agent Millard at Pawhuska. The Osages are already known as "the richest people in the world."
