David O. McKay of Salt Lake, Will Be Present Saturday and Sunday.

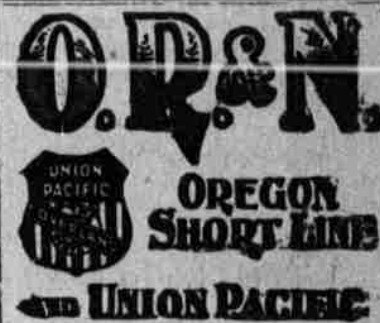
