

DRAFT PLANS FOR PARK

Plans for the grandstand and the bleachers to be erected on the grounds selected for the new athletic park, are being drafted today. While the contractors are working on this phase of the project, the promoters have been surveying the tract just north of the "Y" and will soon have the land staked out.

The instructions which the contractors are working on, call for a grandstand that will seat 600 people; and bleachers, one on each end of the grandstand, that will hold 300 each. This will seat as large a crowd as ever attends a ball game in the city.

Careful consideration of the sun's rays are taken in laying out the diamond. Afternoon games are the most common and the field is arranged in accordance. The only player who will have to face the sun is the left fielder, as the general direction of the field will be easterly and northwesterly. The grandstand is to face about southeast.

There are several depressions in the ground, but to level these the street grader will be used to "skin" the diamond and the entire outfield. The quarter-mile track, which will be about 20 feet wide the last 220 yards and about half that for the first 220 yards, will be rolled with the heavy street roller. This insures a firm and suitable footing for the runners. The entire field to be used by baseball teams is to be sprinkled just prior to each game to avoid a possibility of dust. To do this the promoters will erect hydrants at three or more points in the field and with a liberal supply of hose, the grounds can be made suitably wet just before a game.
