

TRAINING IS IRREGULAR.
Early Meet at Walla Walla Necessitates Hard Training Here.
 The unfavorable weather is interfering with the high school track and field team. The candidates are unable to practice regularly, and the effects of the training done one night, is generally lost before the squad gets out again, due to the frequent rains. With the big Walla Walla meet coming so early in the season, the men must necessarily avail themselves of every opportunity to train. In fact, the meet is too early in the season to be practical for eastern Oregon athletes. Washington climatic conditions are different than here and the schools of that state can easily get

in shape by April 30 and May 1, when the preliminaries and finals will be run. However, eastern Oregon teams generally figure conspicuously in these meets.

La Grande's chances this year are conceded to be much stronger than last. Many of the old men are back and those who made mediocre showings at Walla Walla last year, will "be there" much stronger this season.

PARK PLANS ACCEPTED.

Grandstand to Have Nine Tiers of Seats and Be 165 Feet Long.

The plan for the Athletic park have been drafted and accepted. The grandstand is to be 165 feet long and will have nine rows of seats. The main entrance will lead directly to the end of the grandstand. The bleachers will be reached by side entrances.

The promoters are today negotiating with the lumbermen to secure the material. It is thought the lumber will be brought on the ground early next week.

With a grandstand of this capacity, the seating accommodations—bleachers and grandstand combined—will be something over 1200.

Craighoad of Hot Springs, and the secretary, treasurer and a representative from each city of the league, will be selected. The circuit will consist of six cities. Hot Springs, Pine Bluff, Newport and Helena are assured places in the league. Argenta, a suburb of Little Rock, will probably get a franchise, but the sixth city is yet to be definitely selected.
