### RENEW SEARCH FOR TODD.

J. J. Scott of Seattle, Will Seek Body of Troy Todd.

J. J. Scott, an experienced diver and water man of Seattle, has been brought to this city by John Todd for the purpose of searching the Umatilla river thoroughly for the body of Troy Todd, who was drowned at Shallal crossing on the river last Saturday.

Mr. Scott organized a small searching party this morning and will drag the river and make a thorough search in every way in the effort to recover the body of the young man.

Mr. Todd still offers the reward of \$100 for the recovery of the body and it is believed that when the river subsides somewhat that it will be possible to find it. The Indians of the reservation have continued to search, but owing to the high stage of the river it was impossible for them to find any trace.

Mr. Scott, who is to direct the systematic search now, is an experienced water man and will begin at the point where young Todd was dragged from his horse and will follow the river closely, dragging the channel where it may be possible for the body to lodge under water, and carefully searching for a trace that may lead to its recovery.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

### OREGON VS. WASHING.

Freewater-Milton Fruit Crop Beat the Yakima Output by \$50,000.

Quite a reef is taken in the sails of the famous Yakima country when the Freewater-Milton district springs into the limelight with figures which show that as a fruit country Yakima is a back number and plays second fiddle to just a part of the Walla Walla valley, says the Walla Walla Times.

According to the statistics given out, Yakima last year shipped \$450,000 worth of fruit. Freewater-Milton went them \$50,000 better, shipping a total valuation of fruit amounting to \$500,000.

This is a great plum for the Freewater-Milton district to pull out of the northwest fruit pie. It lowers the colors of the proud Yakima and hoists instead those of the Walla Walla valley. Freewater-Milton is not yet developed. This year her figures will be more interesting and the year after still more.

### Bristol Leaves; McCourt Ready.

Though his appointment as U. S. district attorney was confirmed by the senate late yesterday afternoon John McCourt has not yet received any official notification of the fact that he is the federal prosecutor, says Wednesday's Pendleton E. O. Today he

has been at his office as usual, though he has been hourly expecting a message instructing him to proceed to Portland and take immediate charge of the office.

In a 'phone message from Portland this afternoon Mr. McCourt was informed that W. C. Bristol has closed the office and regards himself as no longer district attorney. The grand jury which he convened recently has been excused until next Tuesday.

Upon the request of the Portland Oregonian for a statement of his policies while in office Mr. McCourt gave the following interview at a late hour last night:

"I, of course, do not know and will not know until I have assumed the duties of the office, what matters are pending there, requiring attention. I intend to dispose of all matters pending when I enter the office, as well as those arising in the future, as rapidly as conditions will permit.

"Offenders against the law will be brought to as speedy a trial and as vigorous prosecution, as the interests of the defendants will allow.

"The office will receive my undivided attention.

"All criminal matters will receive full investigation and where indictments are returned, vigorous prosecutions will follow.

"Civil matters will receive my earnest attention and the government's rights will be protected so far as it lies in my power to protect them.

"I expect to give the government while in the office, as I have always given other clients, the best service within my ability."

According to Mr. McCourt, he has not yet decided upon whom he will appoint as deputies and will not make the appointments until he is actually in office.

Though he will have to move to Portland and retire from private law practice, Mr. McCourt will still continue as one of the firm of McCourt & Phelps, though his partner will henceforth do all the work.
