## J. B. STODDARD ON U. S. SENATOR

Governor Chamberlain has spoken, and in no uncertain terms. He has shown himself to be a consummate master of the art of politics. If the leaders among the republicans could only play the game like George does, how different it would be. The governor understands humanity and knows how to play upon the chords of human feeling. The secret of his success lies in this: The people believe he is sincere while he in turn has absolute faith in the common people. The republican leaders seem to think the people are not to be trusted, and this is where they make the fatal mistake. The sovereign power in this country resides in the people. They are the power behind the throne, in fact, they are the throne itself. Lincoln's great power was derived more from his unbounded love for, and faith in the people, than it was from his great office and the glory of conquering armies. Napoleon arose to his high station through the love and faith of his people, and he fell when he lost that love and faith, and the republican party of Oregon must show its devotion to and confidence in the people, or it cannot hope to succeed.

It is a fatal error to attempt to refuse the people the right to nominate United States senator and to instruct the representatives to vote for the people's choice. The very fact that you fear Chamberlain will be the people's choice will be the means of making him so, because you are destroying the faith of the people in your sincerity. The republicans enacted the primary law, why should they seek to repudiate it?

A party can make no more serious blunder than to assume an attitude which expresses plainly that the people are not to be trusted in making choice of United States senator at the polls. On the other hand, we have the governor making his plea that he has unbounded faith in the people. The republicans again show their weakness when they express the fear that a democrat may be selected in a state with nearly 30,000 republican majority. There is some reason for this fear, and it is well founded. The republican party can regain the confidence and support of the people, but not so long as the party appears to be unwilling to trust the people's choice for United States senator.

### COLONIST TRAVEL DROPS OFF.

Sunday Trains Into Spokane Carry Small Number of Easterners.

Travel to the northwest under the colonist rates showed a decided decrease yesterday, when the number of this class of passengers for Spokane and points west on the transcontinental trains was less than on any day since the arrival of the first trains, says the Spokesman-Review.

It is estimated that not more than 175 came to Spokane over the Great Northern and Northern Pacific yesterday on colonist tickets, and of this number less than 50 stopped here. The Northern Pacific express arriving from the Twin Cities last night at 11:50, had aboard about 60 colonists and less than a score ended their journey in Spokane.

"I believe that the majority of the passengers who rode on the colonist tickets are looking for work," said J. H. Rothbert of Eau Claire, Wis., who arrived in Spokane last night. "I came here myself to look for work in the sawmills. I was working west of the mountains when the mills shut down last fall on account of the raise in the freight rates on lumber. I saw a number of sawmill men on the train, but they went on to the Sound. The impression in the east is that the sawmills in the northwest are all going to resume running in full force this spring."
