There is one constitutional amendment that should receive the condemnation of every citizen who stands for clean municipal government, and we refer to the amendment which will give "additional and exclusive power to cities and towns, within their corporate limits, to license, regulate, control and tax, or to suppress or prohibit theaters, race tracks, pool rooms, bowling alleys, billiard halls and the sale of liquors, subject to the provisions of the local option law of the state of Oregon."

We do not believe there will be any opposition to the proposed constitutional amendment to change the pay of our legislators from \$3 per day to \$10, or \$400 for the regular 40 days' session. The present pay is too small; the ordinary citizen that goes to the legislature does so at a personal loss of time and money.

The proposed amendment to our state constitution to permit the location of state institutions elsewhere than at the capital, seems to be a movement in the right direction. Such institutions should be located where the necessities might require.

The proposed amendment to the constitution that we hold our elections in November instead of June, is the plan adopted in most of our states, and in presidential years would save the expense of holding one election.

There is very little being said for or against the woman suffrage amendment that will be voted on at the June election.

Must Pay Back \$35,000,000.

Washington, March 21.—Thirty-five million dollars of the public deposits made by the secretary of the treasury during the money stringency in October and November, must be returned by Monday, in accordance with the call of Secretary Cortelyou. A large portion of this sum has already been paid and it is not thought that the calling in of the funds will result in any hardship to the banks. The treasury is now operating under a heavy deficit, paying out daily an average of \$400,000 more than it receives. In addition to eliminating the deficit, the secretary is endeavoring to restore the \$50,000,000 working balance, to provide for emergency, and to facilitate the transfer of cash between the various sub-treasuries.
