The object is apparent to all, being in the interest of the wide-open town policy. If passed, this law would divest sheriffs and district attorneys of the power to suppress pool rooms and Sunday saloons. and to give municipal authorities power to run a town as wide open as they desire. It is a saloon measure. pure and simple, and if the people take the trouble to investigate before they vote, this measure will be defeated by thousands of votes. Must Pay Back \$35,000,000

Washington, March 21 .- Thirty-five million dollars of the public deposits hade by the secretary of the treasury during the money stringency in October and November, must be returned by Monday, in accordance with the call of Secretary Cortelyou. A large portion of this sum has already been paid and it is not thought that the calling in of the funds will result in any hardship to the banks. The treasury is now operating under a heavy deficit, paying out daily an average of \$400,000 more than it receives. In addition to eliminating the deficit, the secretary is endeavoring to restore the \$50,000,000 working balance, to provide for emergency, and to fecilitate the transfer of cash between the various sub-treasuries.
