TEST POWER OF BAILEY

Fort Worth, Texas, March 21.—As a result of the big anti-Bailey convention in Waco recently and the feeling that has developed between the Bailey and anti-Bailey factions, the state democratic executive committee was reconvened today by Chairman Garden and will order a special primary election to decide on four delegates at large to the Denver convention.

Senator Bailey has been placed before the voters as a candidate for delegate at large, the other members of the proposed "Big Four" being United States Senator Culbertson, Governor T. M. Campbell and State Chairman Garden. At its meeting last month the state committee decided not to call a primary election, since the state election law provides for precinct conventions to send delegates to a state convention. The opposition to Bailey has now become so bitter, however, that the friends of the distinguished Texas statesman are determined to have a primary and allow the voters to settle the matter.

The opposition to Bailey, once the popular idol of the democrats of Texas grew out of his alleged connection with the Waters-Pierce Oil company, a subsidiary corporation of the Standard Oil company. Enemies of the senator declare that he was "white-washed" by the Texas legislature and that the good name of Texas demands his expulsion from public life. At the recent anti-Bailey meeting in Waco there was exhibited a great oil can, bearing the question: "Shall this, or the people, rule the state?" With the calling of a primary, the people will have an opportunity to decide for themselves.

HAILEY LEFT BIG ESTATE.

Late Jurist Provided Well for the Future of His Family.

When Judge T. G. Halley died in Portland Sunday night he left an estate that will amount to a sum in the neighborhood of \$40,000 and practically all of the property goes to his wife.

Life insurance, aggregating \$25,000, constitutes the principal part of Judge Halley's legacy and the policies were all in favor of Mrs. Halley. In view of the fact that some of the real property owned by Judge Halley was partly incumbered the life insurance money will greatly assist in the settlement of the estate.

Aside from his insurance Judge Halley owned the Alfalfarm ranch on Wild Horse creek, which has 700 acres of land and his residence property on the north side of the river in Pendleton. However, all of the real property was bequeathed to Mrs. Halley at the time of the judge's former illness.

Other assets consist of the judge's law library, valued at \$4,000, notes and accounts and stock in the Commercial National bank. In the opinion of W. L. Thompson, cashier of that bank, and who is familiar with Mr. Halley's business affairs, the estate will net between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

Owing to the fact that the life insurance and all of the property was left to Mrs. Halley the estate may not be administered.
