TEAM LEAVES FOR TRIP

The Enterprise indoor baseball
team left Enterprise this morning by
train and will reach La Grande to-
morrow night, when the Elgin train
arrives.

The team has been training and
practicing with renewed energy since
arranging the double-header date
with La Grande. The team is without
question one of the strongest that has
ever been brought to La Grande, and
the home team will be kept on its
toes during the two games which will
be pulled off here, if it wins either or
both of them.

Little Difference in Rules.

There is practically no material
difference in the rules of indoor base-
ball from those of the outdoor game.
The diamond of course, is much
smaller, the distance between bases
being 27 feet. The batter is con-
fined to a 3x4 foot rectangle while
batting. A base runner must not
leave his base for another base until
the pitched ball has either been
caught or passed the catcher. The
pitcher must deliver the ball to the
batter with an underhanded throw,
keeping the arm parallel with the
body. There are other rules of some
import that differ slightly from out-
door rules, but to the spectator are
immaterial.

Two Games Here.

The team will spend one day here
before the first contest. The games
will start at 8 o'clock in the Noyes
rink on Wednesday and Thursday
evenings.

has not been decided upon, but the
team which faces the Shepherders
will be selected from S. D. Crowe,

guson, Merrill Childers, Sherwood Wil-

Snodgrass.

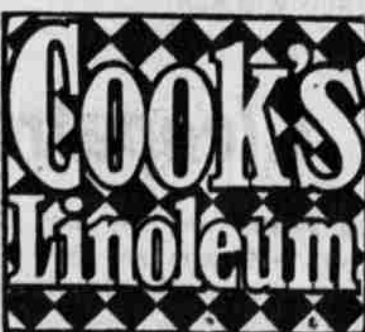
