HUMAN NATURE AND RELIGIOUS TRUTH.

towards the contrary. The law then
is good and its end is to promote the
good. It could not be otherwise if
society is to continue. Goodness alone
can build up, for that which is evil
invariably destroys, as it is destruct-
ive from its very nature. It is a max-
im both in the moral and physical
world, that nothing destroys itself and
that whatever has a tendency to de-
stroy a system or a body, is foreign
to that system or body. It cannot
naturally belong to it. Thus the law
of our nature must naturally be vir-
tue. The man who is not living vir-
tuously is living unnaturally. The
law of our nature demands that we
live godly, soberly and righteously.
Godly, that is, in the fear of God,
because the law of our nature has a
law-giver back of it to enforce and
vindicate it. Soberly, because it de-
mands temperance in all things for
its proper development. Righteously
because right doing is required to up-
build and not pull down ourselves, or
society.

I have said that man's nature pos-
sesses certain qualities which are in-
tended to keep him in touch with and
bind him to the rest of mankind. For
instance, it has the quality of love,
from which are derived benevolence,
friendship and charity. These quali-
ties would be absolutely unintelligible
and useless if man were a being meant
to live alone and apart from his fel-
lows. But it may be urged that man's
nature possesses qualities the very re-
verse of the above. True, but these
can clearly be shown to be unnatural
because of their destructive effects.
When allowed to govern a man's ac-
tions they injure himself as well as
others. Their evil effects are most
clearly seen in national life as they
are the cause of war and untold loss
of life. So we may confidently say
that "Love one another" is the natu-
ral law for men. Which is the natural
condition evidently intended for the
infant? A condition of love and pro-
tection or of hatred and neglect? The
infant is the key to the whole prob-
lem as the child is the father of the
man and the same condition which is
natural at the beginning of life con-
tinues to be the natural one to its end.

We are confirmed in the conclusion
that virtue is the law of our nature
by the witness of conscience which
makes itself felt most when we are
doing wrong. It seeks most energeti-
cally when in a healthy state to keep
us from doing evil. It makes us feel
uneasy and apprehensive of the future.
Sometimes it is so loud that it seems
as a voice speaking to our innermost
soul. Just as pain acts as a warning
signal that an unnatural condition
exists when we do wrong. And unless
a man forcibly stifles it, it will con-
tinue to warn until the unnatural
condition ceases and the natural one is
restored by our returning to that
which is right.

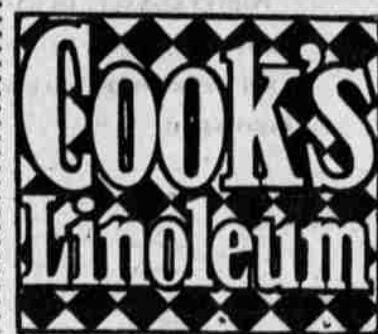
