ADAMS IS DESERTED

According to reports received at Wallace, Steve Adams, who was twice tried for the murder of Fred Tyler, in Shoshone county, has been forsaken by the Western Federation of Miners and other former friends, now that the Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone cases are things of the past.

The Wallace Press says Adams is complaining bitterly of the treatment he is receiving. "For some time Adams occupied the position of pet dog for the Western Federation of Miners," says the Press, "and the best counsel that could be had for love or money in the United States, was engaged for him until his sphere of utility disappeared with the dismissal of the case against Moyer. At this point Western Federation sympathy seems to have come to an abrupt close and since Steve was taken to Telluride charged with the murder of Barney, it appears that he has suddenly been forgotten."

"Until a week ago this poor, persecuted farmer boy lay in his cell unvisited by a single soul, not even his wife. The only face that Steve has seen since his sojourn in Telluride began, is that of the jailer who brings him his meals, while the only company that has appeared to take any interest in him at all has been that of one or two transient criminals."

"Steve has been complaining bitterly that no one has come to his aid. He is reported as having said that the state has all kinds of evidence against him, but that he has no one to whom he can turn to work up a defense for him; the brilliant counsel who defended him before have now apparently forgotten his existence."

"About a week ago Leon Whitsell called on Steve at Telluride and represented that he would defend him in the Barney case. Whitsell applied to the sheriff for admittance to Adams' cell for a lengthy consultation. While this was going on the sheriff was called away to another part of the district on business, and left under the belief that Whitsell, who had been locked in the cell with Adams, would be released by the jailer."

"Whitsell had come to see Adams about 10 o'clock in the morning, but when he tried to get his release it turned out that he was unknown to the jailer, who refused to let him out except under order from the sheriff. The result of it was that Whitsell was kept beside Adams until about 11 o'clock that night."

"Whether or not Whitsell will defend Adams remains to be seen. No body now appears to take enough interest in the matter to care whether Adams is defended at all or not. All of which is very strange considering the awful tales of persecution that were poured forth prior to the conclusion of the Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone cases."
